

A Word from the Heart

I have been reading 1 and 2 kings and also plan to read about the prophets dealing with the decline and fall of Israel and Judah. After Solomon died the northern tribes of Israel appointed their own King who set up two places of idol worship. This was to keep them from going to Jerusalem for feast of the Lord and from becoming more united.

All of the Kings of Israel were considered bad. The tribe of Judah still had Jerusalem for worship and many of their Kings were described as doing "what was right in the eyes of the Lord, as did their father David." King Asa, the great grandson of Solomon, had no use for idols or their worship. Only the fact that he does not remove the high places mars the narrator's assessment of his reign. King Asa of Judah has given me much food for thought. Only two other kings of Judah (Hezekiah and Josiah) receive higher commendation than Asa.


Asa introduced many reforms, such as putting away Sodomites and male prostitutes, removing idols from the Holy place and breaking down altars used for idol worship. He deposed the queen mother because of idolatrous practices and the image she made for Asherah. 1 Kings, 15:12.

Although the King was mostly a zealous reformer, his subjects did not always keep pace with him. 1 kings 15:17. 2 Chronicles 14 and 15 gives us another glance to what might have

happened because of not putting away all of the high places. It does say he put down the high places in Judah. The chronicler said the high places were not removed in Israel. The idols were at one time removed but crept back. His subjects would not be controlled, but found measures of maintaining them in some places, perhaps remote areas.

Asa had two battles against en-

emies and showed a contradiction in his spiritual attitudes. Early in his reign the Ethiopians advanced upon Judah with an enormous army. Asa was terrified by the battle that awaited and cried out to the Lord, "O Lord our God for we rest in you and in your name we go against this multitude O Lord". Similar words were sung by the five men killed in the Ecuadorian jungle almost 60 years ago. The Ethiopians were overthrown and they could not recover. Years later King Baasha of Israel came up against Juda and built Ramah to isolate Asa and Judah from the people of Israel. This battle produced a far different reaction on the part of Asa. Instead of praying, he turned to the ungodly and dangerous King of Syria for help. He delivered a large amount of the Lord's riches to Ben-Hadad for support. Asa approached by a prophet was rebuked for not having turned to the Lord as he had done against the Ethiopians. He was told his heart



was not loyal to the Lord. Asa was angry and threw the prophet into prison because of those words. Three years later Asa became diseased in his feet (gout?) and his malady was severe. He did not seek the Lord but only the physicians. It is a sad chronicle that as the years rolled on he became less faithful to Jehovah and the law.

There are many spiritual lessons for all of those of us whose hearts

are dedicated to the Lord. We need courage to put away idols that have long claimed our time and energy. Are there not idols in our hearts and homes that need drastic demolition? An idol is that which has a place of interest and affection in our life that God alone should have. In his "old age" Asa failed grievously. He broke the covenant made to seek the Lord. (2 Chron. 15:12) The unequal yoke he made with the king of Syria forfeited the help of God despite initial success.

Our fellowship with the Savior is day by day. We can't live on the strength of our past experiences although they do teach us spiritual lessons. To become angry with someone who faithfully corrects us is a clear display of our spiritual condition. All of us should desire to end well in pleasing the Lord.

IRS Proposes Churches, Nonprofits Get Social Security Numbers From Donors

Tax return information for about 100,000 U.S. taxpayers was illegally accessed by cyber criminals over the past four months, U.S. IRS Commissioner John Koskinen said on Tuesday, the latest in a series of data thefts that have alarmed American consumers.



The IRS says the Social Security reporting requirement, which would impact only organizations that fall into the 501(c)(3) category, would be optional, but some critics are worried this might become a standard.

mation from confidentiality and a

security point of view."

The IRS may soon require churches and other nonprofit charities to report the Social Security numbers of their donors contributing at least \$250 annually. The news has raised concerns about security, IRS targeting and government overreach.

A report from FOX News says lawmakers and charities alike are concerned about the impact this proposal from the Obama administration could have on churches and charities if it gets the greenlight.

"There's a big caution here. There's a big yellow light that should be flashing for a couple of reasons," Illinois Republican Rep. Peter Ros-

"It's the No. 1 regulation that people are commenting upon," said attorney Cleta Mitchell who represents the conservative-leaning group TRUE the VOTE, which says it has already been harassed by the IRS, according to FOX News.

She believes that the IRS cannot be trusted and the request would affect the ability of charities to collect enough money to survive.

"It would have a dramatic effect on donors' decisions on whether or not to contribute," she said. "You'd see a lot of \$249.99 contributions to every charitable organization in America. It's preposterous."

Same-Sex Marriage Is 'Devastating for American Children,' Says Tony Perkins

WASHINGTON — In his 2016 State of the Family Address, Family Research Council President Tony Perkins argued that President Obama's efforts at strengthening American families have "faded completely."

Perkins, a leading social conservative activist, chastised the president the day before his last State of the Union Address for policies that have negatively impacted the traditional definition of families, and called last June's Supreme Court ruling that legalized same-sex marriage a devastation for children.

"Our blindness to the reality of the disintegration of the family and the dismissal of the role of our churches must also end," Perkins stated at the conservative activist organization's annual address. "The promise of strong efforts these past seven years to restore fatherhood and re-establish family life in our poorest communities has faded completely. Instead, national policies have sown confusion about the very definition of family."

Perkins continued by contending that the Obama administration's advocacy for the legalization of same-sex marriage contradicted his promotion of responsible fatherhood through the creation of the Office of Faith-Based and Neighborhood Partnerships.

"President Obama has extolled the virtues of fatherhood even as he has fought for same-sex marriage, in essence saying two same-gendered persons can parent as well as a mom and a dad," Perkins asserted. "This contradictory message is more than disappointing — for children throughout the country it is devastating. It reduces mothers and fathers to genderless caregivers."

"Our children deserve better — they deserve a mom and a dad. And we pay a price for this incoherent ideological campaign by havoc in our homes and blood in our streets," Perkins added. "That's why we have to re-empower American parents. The decisions of our courts on contraception for minors, abortion-on-demand, and redefining marriage have gravely weakened the family."

Perkins also called for religious liberty to be restored for business owners and government

officials who wish to act in accordance with their religious beliefs.

As many citizens in the United States feel it violates their faith to participate in same-sex weddings, an Oregon Christian couple who owned a bakery and a Christian grandma florist in Washington who refused to provide their services for same-sex weddings were fined hundreds of thousands of dollars by their respective state governments for fol-

lowing their religious convictions.

Similarly, Kentucky clerk Kim Davis was jailed in 2015 when she refused to issue marriage licenses to same-sex couples because she did not want her name on a certificate that authorized a marriage that she believed went against God's definition of marriage. Although she called for the the state's former Democratic governor to enact a religious accommodation for Christian clerks like her, it wasn't until late December that new Kentucky Gov. Matt Bevin granted her the accommodation she was looking for.

As one of his proposals to restore religious liberty to Americans, Perkins stressed the importance of passing the First Amendment Defense Act, which would provide religious liberty accommodations against discrimination laws for businesses and institutions that act in accordance with their sincerely-held religious beliefs

"Religious liberty, both at home and abroad, must also be at center stage. The First Amendment Defense Act is a first and vital step," Perkins said. "This measure should not be necessary in a nation governed by constitutional principles. But those principles have been severely weakened, and Congress has the responsibility as a co-equal branch to make the meaning of the First Amendment plain and potent again."

Perkins also chastised liberals who label those who act according to their beliefs as "bigots,"



"haters," and "extremists," stating that name calling is just an attempt to silence all who oppose their agenda.

"But we should take heart even from this. Our opponents seek to limit our freedom of speech because they fear its power," Perkins quipped. "They seek to restrain the expression of our convictions because they are unsure of the truth of theirs. The freedom of expression is the very essence of liberty.

But there can be no liberty at all in America without religious liberty."

Perkins also used his address to point out that the pro-life movement grew greatly in 2015.

After the Center for Medical Progress released a series of undercover videos exposing the sell of aborted baby body parts at Planned Parenthood clinics, many throughout the nation were shocked, and it reinvigorated the pro-life movement in its call for the federal government to strip the nation's largest abortion provider of federal funding.

Last week, Congress passed a spending bill that eliminated most federal funding from Planned Parenthood, making it the first time a bill essentially defunding Planned Parenthood has been sent to the White House.

"Another bright light in 2015 is the way the fight for life intensified as America became a more pro-life nation," Perkins said. "And while the president vetoed a measure last Friday that would have eliminated most federal tax dollars going to Planned Parenthood, rest assured we will not stop until this forced partnership between taxpayers and Planned Parenthood has ended."

Perkins also pointed out that over 280 prolife bills were enacted at the state level and there are now over 2,500 pregnancy care centers across the nation that inform women about other options besides abortion, such as adoption.

Our Stake in the Union by Tony Perkins

When he took office, Barack Obama promised hope. And with his final term almost over, Americans finally have it. For most of the country, the last seven years have been a tragic departure from the values that made America a great nation. But as far as the White House is concerned, that isn't cause for concern -- but celebration. It means that this president has accomplished exactly what he said he set out to do: fundamentally transform America

The evidence of it is everywhere -- from the danger on our streets to the confusion in our classrooms; from the further fracturing of the family to the misuse of our military. And unfortunately, we'll be spending the better part of a generation trying to repair the damage of the Obama administration. But, as everyone watching this evening's State of the Union knows, there is light at the end of the lawless tunnel. We see it in the fresh face sitting in the Speaker's chair behind President Obama. We see it in the audience, where brave women like Kim Davis and the Little Sisters of the Poor will be sitting -- symbols of defiance in the president's war on religious liberty. And we see it in the speeches of the men and women vying to stand exactly where the president is next year.

Tonight, we remember that for every outrageous ruling on marriage, there were brave county clerks. For each attack on faith and nature's law, there were cities like Houston. And for every atheist suing to take God out schools, there were godly principals. At last night's State of the Family address at FRC, we paid tribute to them all -- and called on the Church to pray and act for a spiritual, moral, and cultural renewal in our nation. That may not be the message the president brings to the American people tonight, but it's the message our country needs to hear. Surrounded by some of the survivors of the president's last seven years, I laid out our key concerns for the family and our broader culture.

Marriage, religious liberty, human sexuality, the church, race relations, and our core beliefs have all been devastated under this administration. But,

as I told last night's crowd, this past

year has shown us that we cannot and will not be permitted to separate ourselves from the social battles that are underway in the nation. As Christians, if we can't live according to our faith -- whether it's in the home, whether it's in the workplace, in the school -- then we really can't be the Americans that we have the right to be.

Our opponents try to limit our freedom of speech because they fear its power. And that power is exactly what Kim Davis, Texas Pastors Hernon Castano and Charles Flowers, and Principal Jason Rowland showed by standing up to the forces of political oppression. Whether they faced lawsuits like Jason, jail time like Kim, government hostility like Hernon and Charles, courage won the day. And as Pastor Castano knows from overturning Houston's bathroom bill, that courage is contagious. Brave Christians are sending a message to the country, he told the Washington Times, that it "should respect the people and the body of Christ."

Sadly, the man standing before a joint session of Congress tonight isn't heeding that message. That's why, I believe, it's time for America's religious leaders to come together and show our political leaders a way forward. 47 Members of Congress Defend Coach Kennedy's Freedom to Pray After Games

Forty-seven members of Congress have signed onto a joint letter to the Bremerton School District in Washington explaining that Bremerton High football coach Joe Kennedy has the constitutionally guaranteed right to kneel and pray on the 50-yard line after games.

The school district is currently reviewing Kennedy's job status after the Christian coach defied school district orders and contin-

ued his tradition of praying at midfield following the conclusion of games.

Although Kennedy never forces students to join in his prayer, many students choose to join him in prayer. The school district has warned Kennedy that he needs to wait until students leave the stadium until he can pray or else that would



violate the Establishment Clause of the U.S. Constitution.

Washington State Education Superintendent Randy Dorn backed the school district's attempt at censorship in a statement last week saying that, "leading prayer might put a student in awkward position even if the prayer is voluntary. What's more, the official could open up the district to lawsuits."

In a letter sent Tuesday to Bremerton School District Superintendent Aaron Leavell that was headed by the co-chairs of the Congressional Prayer Caucus, Rep. Randy Forbes, R-Va., and Sen. James Lankford, R-Okla., Congress members explained that the school district's position that the coach's prayer violates the Establishment Clause is completely wrong.

"The Establishment Clause exists to ensure that the government cannot affirmatively impose or elevate one religion over another. However, it does not prohibit the government from referencing religion altogether, nor does it require that government officials proactively scrub all references of religion from the public square," the letter asserts. "Rather, the Establishment Clause ensures both that the government does not show preference to a certain religion, and that government does not take away an individual's ability to exercise religion."

The letter cites the recent Supreme Court case Town of Greece v. Galloway, where the court ruled that the town did not violate the the Establishment Clause by opening its town meetings with a prayer offered by clergy members because it does not coerce participation by non adherents.

8 Characteristics of Evangelistic Pastors

This week I've been preparing some lectures for my upcoming seminars in the DMin in Church Revitalization and Great Commission Leadership at Southeastern Seminary.

For years, I've kept a running list of characteristics of pastors who lead effective evangelistic churches (that is, churches that are reaching non-believers rather than simply reaching other church members).

Below are eight of those characteristics.

1. They believe the Bible is the Word of God.

Consequently, they accept the truth that people who don't have a personal relationship with Jesus are without hope. The Word drives them to want to reach people.

2. They take the lead in personal evangelism.

They model evangelism, but not because they happen to be the pastor; they do it because Jesus is in their heart and evangelism is in their blood. These leaders would evangelize even if they weren't pastors.

3. They know the church's numbers.

They're not idolatrous of those numbers, but they're certainly aware of them. "A number represents a person" is much more than an adage to them; it's a reflection of their focus on real people who need Jesus.

4. They take personally any lack of evangelistic growth.

That's not to suggest, though, that they believe they can somehow create growth. It's simply that they so long to see lives changed that they want to evaluate why when it doesn't happen.

5. They've led their churches to get ready for growth.

They're not always fully prepared for what God does, but their churches don't take lightly their responsibility to disciple new believers God gives them. They have the "nursery" ready for babes in Christ.

6. They know their community welland they love that community.

They can usually describe the general demographic makeup of their community, not only because they've studied the data but also because they've walked the streets. They're glad to live where they live, and they hope to stay there awhile.

7. They hold their staff accountable for doing evangelism.

They may not always require written reports, but they're intentional about asking for verbal reports during staff meetings. Typically, they're hesitant to hire anyone who doesn't have a strong evangelism record.

8. Increasingly, they are more committed to church planting.

Because these pastors want to see people saved, they've often joined the forces emphasizing evangelistic church planting today. They aren't worried that everyone comes to their church, and they're willing to send out some of their best to start congregations.

To me, it has been a source of great comfort and strength in the day of battle, just to remember that the secret of steadfastness, and indeed, of victory, is the recognition that "the Lord is at hand." ~Duncan Campbell

Christian Bakers Pay \$135K Fine to Lesbian Couple for Refusing to Make Gay Wedding Cake

An Oregon Christian couple have paid the state-ordered \$135,000 in damages to a lesbian couple for refusing to bake a wedding cake for their same-sex ceremony earlier this year.

The Oregonian reported on Monday that Aaron Klein, the former co-owner of the now defunct Sweet Cakes by Melissa, handed over a check of \$136,927.07 to the Oregon Bureau of Labor and Industries' Portland office for the damages and accrued interest.

Aaron and Melissa Klein had initially said that they will not be paying the money to Rachel and Laurel Bowman-Cryer, the lesbian couple they refused to bake a cake for in 2013. The Kleins have explained that their objection to participating in same-sex weddings stems from their religious belief that traditional marriage is defined as a union between one man and one woman.

The story stirred great debate in the U.S. over religious freedom issues, and the couple received significant support online — a fundraising campaign raised at least \$515,000 as of late September for their cause.

The Christian couple also received support from notable conservative leaders, including the Rev. Franklin Graham.



"Give me a break. In my opinion, this couple should pay the Kleins \$135,000 for all they've been through," Graham said in a Facebook message in July.

"Even more outrageous is that Avakian has also now ordered the Kleins to 'cease and desist' from speaking publicly about not wanting to bake cakes for same-sex weddings based on their Christian beliefs. This is an outright attack on their #freedomofspeech," he added.

The recent payment, however, does not mean that the Kleins have abandoned their appeal of the order, said attorney Tyler Smith. The lawyer revealed that his clients made the decision to pay the money now rather than to incur additional interest charges, but said that the Oregon Court of Appeals will be hearing arguments over the case in 2016.

Smith said that the bureau "was attempting to charge interest rates of 9 percent, equating to \$35 a day, and seeking to garnish any assets of the Kleins so they couldn't earn interest on the money that had been donated to them."

"The prudent thing to do, given the generosity of people who have contributed funds, was to take care of it and continue the fight," he added, according to The Oregonian.

Heisman Winner Derrick Henry: Always Keep God First, Don't Be Afraid to Pray

After winning college football's most prestigious award, University of Alabama running back Derrick Henry praised God and advised aspiring young athletes to keep God first while pursuing their dreams.

The 21-year-old Henry, who set a new Southeastern Conference record for nearly 2,000 rushing yards this season as a junior, fulfilled what he called a "lifelong dream" when he was named the 2015 winner of the Heisman Trophy in New York City on Saturday.

"First off, I just want to thank God for bringing me here and winning the prestigious award," Henry, who scored 23 touchdowns this season, said during his acceptance speech. "He's been so good to me in my life and I have been honored and blessed with this opportunity. Since I was a kid, it has been my lifelong goal and a dream of mine. I am just so thankful."

After thanking his mother and father, Henry then thanked his grandmother, who he says helped to make him into a man and taught him the importance of keeping God at the center of his life.

"My grandmother, the woman who made me into the man I am today, I want to thank you so much," Henry exclaimed. "Even though you couldn't be here, I feel you in spirit and I love you so much. You made me into who I am today — hard work, dedication and just doing what I wanted to do. You always told me to

keep God first and pray that I always make it far. I just want to thank you and let you know that I love you and that I am praying for you."

After going through his list of acknowledgments, Henry then turned his attention to the children listening to him. "I just want to talk to the kids who are watching this TV and listening to me today. I just want to give you all advice. I am hoping that I am somebody you can idolize yourself behind and look up to because God is everything and always keep God first," Henry urged. "Always pray; don't be afraid to pray. He always hears you cry. If you have dreams, chase them. If you believe it, you can achieve it and God will be there every step of the way. I am a living testament, man."

"Growing up and having this dream, I never thought I would end up here. But God is good, and I get on my hands and knees every night and pray and thank him for everything," Henry shared. "So, keep God first, always pray and always chase your dream."

"The court rejected the feeble argument that a reasonable observer would believe that the government was favoring Christianity over other religions. The content of what was volunteered was irrelevant, so long as all were welcome," the letter explains. "The crucial principles are no less applicable here."

"The mere act of a single individual kneeling alone after the conclusion of a game to quietly pray coerces no one, even when that individual is a school employee," the letter continues. "That others may choose to join him of their own free will is irrelevant, and an exercise of their own constitutional freedoms."

According to an announcement by the Christian law firm the Liberty Institute on Monday, Kennedy plans to file a lawsuit against the school district because the district has not provided a religious accommodation and continues to threaten to fire Kennedy if he continues with his postgame prayers.

Kennedy, who is a Desert Storm and Desert Shield combat veteran, is now being denied the freedom that he fought so hard to protect, Family Research Council president Tony Perkins argued.

"The Bremerton football coach didn't spend 20 years defending freedom only to have his stolen, but that's exactly what the school district is threatening," Perkins wrote in his Tuesday Washington Update.

Perkins also stated that the school district's actions violate the Constitution and the previous Supreme Court precedents.

"Stop praying or start walking. That's the message from the 'tolerant' Left," Perkins argued. "There's just one problem: the school's decision isn't rooted in the law. Teachers, coaches, administrators — or public employees of any kind — don't lose their religious freedom when they step on school property. Insisting otherwise is a violation of their civil rights."

"In the meantime, Joe may lose his job but not his faith," Perkins added. "No one knows better than this combat veteran: the battles — on the field and off — belong to the Lord."

WINTER FRUIT SALAD

l can (20 oz.) pineapple chunks

1/2 c. sugar

2 Tbsp. cornstarch

1/3 c. orange juice

l Tbsp. lemon juice

1 can (110z.) mandarin oranges, drained OR 3 fresh oranges, peeled and cut in chunks

4 unpeeled apples, chopped

2 bananas, sliced

1/2 c. dried cranberries

Drain pineapple, reserving 3/4 c. juice. In a saucepan, combine sugar and cornstarch. Add pineapple juice, orange juice and lemon juice. Cook and stir over medium heat until thickened and bubbly; cook and stir l minute longer. Remove from heat; set aside. In a bowl, combine fruit. Pour warm sauce over fruit, stir to coat. Cover and refrigerate for about 1 hour before serving.





Texas Chick-fil-A Locations Open Sunday to Deliver Free Food for Tornado Victims

Despite the fact that the Christian fast-food chain Chick-fil-A is notorious for being closed on Sundays, several Texas Chick-fil-A locations operated on Sunday to prepare and distribute free food to victims impacted by the deadly tornadoes that created havoc and destruction throughout the state.

After tornadoes and severe storms swept through the Dallas area over a weekend and killed as many as 11 people and damaged hundreds of buildings, Chick-fil-A employees from a number of stores northeast of Dallas opened the kitchens and volunteered their time to provide free food for first responders and victims of the natural disaster. Volunteers also delivered sandwiches to rescue workers and victims.

According to AL.com, Chick-fil-A's charity work in Texas is not the first time the Christian-based chain has provided for communities and families facing disaster and hardships.

In 2014, a Chick-fil-A location in Alabama distributed over 1,000 chicken sandwiches and biscuits to hundreds of people who were trapped by snow on the highways around Birmingham.

In early December, the owner of a Chick-fil-A in Tennessee teamed up with a local pastor to help purchase a minivan for a mother of two whose car caught on fire in the restaurant parking lot.



The owner of the Chick-fil-A also donated \$500 to the family.

Although Chick-fil-A has a history of providing for those in need, the company's charity efforts are not always welcomed by those who don't agree with the company's biblical Christian view on gay marriage.

In September 2014, a Chick-fil-A restaurant was prohibited from donating up to 200 meals to a local California high school booster club because the school principal did not agree with the chain's owner's views on same-sex marriage.

THANK GOD!

About then he realizes he's heading for a huge cliff and yells, "Whoa!" But the horse doesn't even slow! It's coming up REAL QUICK and he's doing everything he can to make the horse stop. "Whoa, stop, hold on!" Finally he remembers, "AMEN!!!"

The horse stops a mere two inches from the cliff's edge, almost throwing him over its head. The man, panting and heart racing, wipes the sweat from his face and leans back in the saddle. "Oh!" he said, gasping for air, "Thank God."



Inner Beauty Center

January is Human Trafficking Awareness Month. It is hidden in plain sight. Human trafficker's target one specific group of people... those who are vulnerable. Many factors create this vulnerability. To learn more check out the links listed below. Wisconsin has over 200 documented cases of human trafficking from all 72 of its counties. For the last 11 years the FBI in cooperation with local law enforcement has conducted Operation Cross Country. Milwaukee has tied for 3rd place in the highest number of juveniles recovered during this operation for the last two

years with cities such as Detroit & Las Vegas. This year in Wisconsin 9 juveniles & 53 adults recovered and 11 traffickers arrested.

Inner Beauty Center has been operating since 2012. We are a gender specific outreach to women (& girls) who are sexually exploited, many of who are victims of human trafficking. Our purpose is to provide a safe place where women who are sexually exploited can find their value, purpose and inner beauty as they discover who God created and personally formed them to be.

How did Inner Beauty Center start? My husband had pastored a church on 15th & Lincoln for 15 years starting in 2000. For the first 10 -11 years we saw the problem of prostitution in the neighborhood, some even on our front steps. We handled this by calling the police, told them they couldn't be on the church steps & sent them down the streets. Some members of the church actually yelled at and called them "names" until they left.

Everything changed the summer of 2011 when a woman in her mid-20's came into the church asking to speak to the Pastor or his wife. "God



told me that if I came in here you would help me." Her words were the Clarion Call we needed to open our eyes to the mission field that was hidden in plain sight. She was deceived by a "friend" who brought her to Milwaukee under false pretense of finding work. When she walked into the apartment, about 2 blocks from the church, she saw other women being abused. It was then her "friend" made it clear what was expected - work the streets to pay for a place to stay & her drugs (her vulnerability.) Fear filled her eyes that day. She was terrified of her trafficker - he'd beaten many times. She was a woman in desperate need of help. We made arrangements to meet her when she called, took her to a safe place, and contacted her mother who helped her returned home.

We did not understand human trafficking. Over the next year we educated ourselves and hosted an awareness event. From this a core group emerged and Inner Beauty Center was formed. In September of 2012 we opened our doors for the first time. In 2014 we became incorporated and in 2015 we obtained our nonprofit status.

In the last 3 years we have assisted 7 women out of this life style. Six are still out of "the life" and are processing through the things they have suffered. We are a support to many more through the drop in center with a healthy meal, clothing, free professional haircuts, a support group, and more. Through our Bridge to the Future Fund we assist those who are ready to exit "the life" and enter Christ-Centered residential programs for survivors of trafficking. Often these programs are out of the state as there are no residential programs for trafficking victims in Wisconsin. Once in the program women find healing,

new meaning and purpose to their lives. There is nothing more encouraging then to speak to one of the women and hear what God has done in their lives.

When we are out on the streets connecting with the women often they know we are "church ladies" even though we do not tell them. We know the judgement that "the church" has put on those in this lifestyle – we did it for years! Now we build trusting relationships and express the love of Christ in practical ways. This opens the door so we can lead them to Christ.

One of our main goals for 2016 is to expand our hours to 5 days a week to better serve those we connect with. 
