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
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A Word From the Heart By John Duckhorn

The church in Thessalonica was barely a couple of months old when the Apostle Paul had to flee for his life. Acts 17:5-10. These new believers were being confused by false teaching and misunderstood some things that Paul taught on the coming of our Lord. That was bad enough but there were unruly believers who, for whatever reason, "began to mooch off of fellow believers". The people were influenced by "busy bodies" and were of no help to the spiritual maturity of the church.

In chapter 5:12-14, the apostle Paul gives some insights to the congregation by teaching them to know how to recognize those who were serving among them in a Christ-like manner. How easily they could be fooled by gifted yet unqualified men. It is not the most active or spectacular person that



would qualify. Humble service and care for others is easy to overlook in strong opinionated society.

Everyone was to look out for each other. Our society shows little of that and enjoys bringing harm to those who do not agree with them. Paul mentions three types of individuals that needed some looking after. "Now we exhort you brethren, warn those who are unruly, comfort the fainthearted, uphold the weak, be patient toward all." (5:14)

Notice that each person is to be treated according to their needs. The unruly is to be warned. The one who is always out of step needs to be urged to walk in step and stay in ranks. Warning someone can cause resentment on their part. Discipline is never pleasant. We need to appeal directly to their conscience, reminding them of what they are in danger of forgetting. Do not forget to deal with the issue and don't drag out a list of errors done over the years. One reason for that is the past issues were to be taken care at that time and not saved up for a more appropriate time.

The next point of concern is "comfort the fainthearted". The word used in the Gospel of John 11:19,31 is to comfort the bereaved. Has a loved one just died? Are they downcast or disheartened? We bring comfort to them by helping them to continue the battle. Some are discouraged on account of various trials and troubles. They need to be cheered up and stimulated. To be harsh with them

will do little good. Judging others is a common Christian habit. The fainthearted must be encouraged and braced up by fellow believers.

The last one on the list is "the weak". Those without strength. This of course is not just the lack of physical strength but rather the morally or spiritually weak. They are in need of sympathetic assistance. To uphold is the idea of supporting another by keeping one's self "over against" the weak so as to sustain them. Put your arms around the weak and uphold them. True shepherding is far more then managing programs and overseeing a smooth-running machine. It is taking time for people. Time that may actually cause us to pay attention to what the Holy Spirit wants to do among us.

New York Church Installs 'Blessing Box' For Neighbors Surviving Harsh Winter Amid COVID Lockdowns

A congregation in New York has installed a "blessing box" on their church property to provide food and clothing for those in need during the COVID-19 lockdowns.

St. James Episcopal Church of Batavia installed the box on Tuesday and filled it with various items, including food, toiletries, hats, gloves, socks, and face masks on Wednesday.

The box was the product of a collaboration between St. James Episcopal and three other nearby churches: Batavia First Presbyterian Church, First Baptist Church of Batavia, and Resurrection Roman Catholic Church.

In comments emailed to The Christian Post recently, St. James Episcopal Deacon Diana Leiker said the blessing box derived from members of the congregation feeling "that a ministry to serve the un-housed and underserved population was needed."

"The city of Batavia has people who are trying to survive in the middle of a Western New York winter during times that are more challenging than ever," said Leiker.

In addition to the other churches' involvement, St. James Episcopal also applied for and received grant money for the project from the Episcopal Diocese of Western New York.

Aside from the various food, clothing, and other items available, the blessing box also includes a prayer box with a slot where people can place prayer requests written on index cards.

"One person will collect the requests twice a week and share them with the larger group, so we can hold people up in prayer on our own and on church prayer lists," Leiker added.

"There are also cards that contain resources and places to go for help throughout the community of Batavia, for people who don't have access to media."

As part of the effort to continue to fuel support for the blessing box, a Facebook group was created to help keep people informed about what supplies are needed.

"There is a new structure in front of St. James Episcopal Church on East Main Street in Batavia. It is quite a bit smaller than the church, but don't let the size of this Blessing Box diminish its mission," stated the group.

Leiker believed that the box was "a way for all of us to let our neighbors know we 'see' them and they are not forgotten," referencing a Zulu greeting called "Sawubona," or "I see you."

"This is what we are doing when we respond to Matthew 25:35, 'for I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you welcomed me," Leiker added.

"We are working with each other, united in purpose, to be Christ in the world and we are blessed by collaborating and meeting new people along the way."

For I was hungry and you gave me something to eat, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you invited me in, I needed clothes and you clothed me, I was sick and you looked after me, I was in prison and you came to visit me. Matthew 25:35,36



South Carolina Legislature Passes Heartbeat Abortion Ban; Governor Expected to Sign By Michael Gryboski

The South Carolina House voted overwhelmingly to support a ban on abortions once a fetal heartbeat is detected, which can be as early as six weeks into a pregnancy.

Known as the "South Carolina Fetal Heartbeat and Protection from Abortion Act," the House passed the bill on February 17th by a vote of 79-35, having already passed the state Senate.

The proposed legislation prohibits "an abortion on a pregnant woman before a physician determines ... whether the human fetus the pregnant woman is carrying has a detectable fetal heartbeat."

Governor Henry McMaster has been a supporter of the legislation and is expected to sign it, making South Carolina the latest in a series of states to pass similar legislation. Lisa Van Riper, president of the pro-life group South Carolina Citizens for Life, celebrated news of the bill's passage in a statement released Wednesday.

"This is an historic day in South Carolina when the House and the Senate have re-established the heartbeat as the scientific, objective standard as the sign of life for the unborn," stated Van Riper. "[The Act] protects not only the unborn but the medically fragile members of our human family."

Groups like the South Carolina chapter of the American Civil Liberties Union denounced the legislation as a de facto ban on abortion, claiming that it is unconstitutional.

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Nearly 3-In-10 Americans Say COVID-19 Pandemic Has **Strengthened Their Faith** By Michael Gryboski

More than one-quarter of Americans say that the COVID-19 pandemic has strengthened their faith, giving the United States the highest percentage among 14 developed countries analyzed for a new Pew Research Center report.

In a report published recently, Pew found that nearly three out of 10 Americans (28%) say that their faith has grown stronger during the pandemic, while nearly four out of 10 say the pandemic has helped strengthen their family bonds.



Attitudes Survey, which was built on interviews conducted among 480,000 individuals in 91 countries. The survey is based on national samples. The U.S. sample consists of a plus or minus 3.7-percentagepoint error margin.

Spain had the second-highest percentage of respondents, saying that the pandemic had strengthened their faith at 16%

From there, it was Italy at 15% and Canada at 13%. Australia, France, South Korea and the United Kingdom in a four-way tie at 10%.

Additionally, 28% of American respondents also said they believed the pandemic had strengthened people's religious faith in their country, which was also the highest percentage among the surveyed developed countries.

At the bottom of the surveyed industrialized nations was Denmark. Just 2% of Danish respondents said their religious beliefs were strengthened during the pandemic.

In Italy, 19% of respondents said that they believed the pandemic had strengthened the religious faith of people in their country.

After Italy, Spain and Netherlands tied with 17% of respondents who said that the faith of the people in their country were strengthened.

At the bottom was Japan, in which only 5% of respondents felt that the people's religious faith in their countries had been strengthened. Additionally, only 5% of Japanese respondents said their own religious beliefs were strengthened during the pandemic.

"The United States recently has experienced some trends toward secularization, including a growing share of the population that does not identify with any religion and a shrinking share of people who say they regularly attend a church or other house of worship," the report reads.

"Still, religion continues to play a stronger role in American life than in many other economically developed

countries."

When asked how the pandemic has impacted their family lives, Pew notes that about four-in-10 adults surveyed in Spain, Italy, the U.S. and the U.K. said that their relationship with family had been strengthened. In Germany, Japan and South Korea, only about two out of 10 people said the same.

Much has been made about the probable long-term impact on religious communities due to the coronavirus pandemic and subsequent shutdowns.

While some have pointed to many churches facing possible closures due to drops in giving and participation, others have noted a growing interest in spiritual matters.

Last November, the legal nonprofit Becket released a Religious Freedom Index report stating that Generation Z Americans have relied on faith more than other generations during the pandemic.

Drawing from a sample of 1,000 U.S. adults conducted Sept. 30 to Oct. 8, the index found that 74% of Gen Z respondents said faith was "at least somewhat important" during the pandemic, putting them above the 62% average of all generations.

The Silent Generation, or those born before the end of World War II, were the second most likely to see faith as "at least somewhat important" at 64%. Generation X was the lowest at 56%.

"This legislation places both medical providers and their patients at risk. It imposes criminal sanctions on abortion-providing doctors unless the procedure is intended to prevent death or serious risk of substantial and irreversible impairment of a major bodily function," stated the ACLU back in January.

"This legislation is unconstitutional. The Fourteenth Amendment to the US Constitution guarantees a right to privacy, and the United States Supreme Court has repeatedly reaffirmed that this right includes a person's ability to make decisions about their healthcare."

Over the past couple of years, multiple states have passed laws that prohibit abortions in most circumstances if the heartbeat of an unborn baby is detected.



These measures have been successfully challenged in the courts, with judges concluding that they violate the right to abortion as laid out in the United States Supreme Court decision Roe v. Wade.

Last July, Tennessee Governor Bill Lee signed a similar measure into law, only to have U.S. District Court Judge William Campbell stop it from being enforced.

"The Act will immediately impact patients seeking abortions and imposes criminal sanctions on abortion providers. The time-sensitive

nature of the procedure also weighs in favor of injunctive relief pending a preliminary injunction hearing," ruled Campbell.

The other day I became quite intrigued to consider examining the word, consider. First I read through various synonyms on the Merriam-Webster Thesaurus website which included: chew over, cogitate, contemplate, debate, deliberate, entertain, eye, kick around, meditate, mull (over), perpend, ponder, pore (over), question, revolve, ruminate, study, think, (about or over), turn, weigh, and wrestle (with). Wow, what a richly-defined word!

It definitely describes an action many

of us are doing automatically as our senses of sight and hearing become bombarded daily with texts, spam messages, newscasts, emails, podcasts, news articles, sermons, phone calls, Face Time, Facebook, Parler, advertising, and more. We may consider every message that enters our mind and allow it to take root or completely ignore the content. Regardless, each interruption means we have been intercepted, invaded, inconvenienced, influenced, irritated, informed, and maybe even infected. Consideration takes time and effort and can be worthwhile.

In fact, the word, "consider" shows up quite commonly in 89 verses of God's Word in the English Standard Version Bible. It can be found in 32 books of both the Old and New Testaments. While reading, studying, and thoroughly considering each of the 89 passages, a new appreciation developed in me for God's inspired writers and reallife examples (including Moses, Samuel, Abigail, Jehoshaphat, Job, David, King Solomon, the woman of Proverbs 31, Isaiah, Jeremiah, Haggai, Matthew, Luke, and Paul).

For example, in Luke 12:27, we are challenged with the words, "Consider the lilies, how they grow: they neither toil nor spin, yet I tell you, even Solomon in all his glory was not arrayed like one of these." Dr. Luke encourages us in this verse to place our complete trust in God for every situation, fear, or anxiety we may encounter. This is especially relevant for these uncertain times. Consider how God, as our Benevolent Father, is using the Spring of 2021 to usher in new beginnings and bring fresh hope along with the anticipation of the glorious message of Easter.

In preparation for Easter this year I encourage you to CONSIDER Jesus'

- · betrayal by one of His disciples,
- abandonment by many, including me and you
- enduring of a horrible calculated scourging
- undergoing a public mockery and cruel placement of the crown of thorns

Koinonia House Brings Gospel Hope to Forgotten Prisoners Amid COVID Lockdowns

Prisoners in Illinois, Mississippi and Louisiana have endured stricter lockdowns due to COVID-19, but thanks to the Christian ministry Koinonia House, professing prisoners have received spiritual encouragement.

Since March 2020, prisoners in Illinois and other states have been in lockdown, said Koinonia House Executive Director Manny Mill to The Christian Post. Mill knows prison from the inside. He became a Christian while hiding from the FBI in Venezuela. When he found God,



he returned to the United States, turned himself in, and served two years in prison.

"Very few Christians care for the prisoner. Most of our churches don't even mention it, when in fact the Bible is filled with it," he said. "When you think of the characters in the Bible — Joseph became a prisoner; Moses became a killer; King David was a former rapist and a killer; Abraham was a pimp and a liar; and Paul was a serial killer."

People always struggle in prison, Mill said. But constant lockdowns and COVID-19 restrictions on the few freedoms prisoners have made it even harder.

"It's very unusual," he said. "Usually, [prisoners] have [freedom of] movement. Depending on the level of the facility, even in a maximum-security they have movement. The movement may be guarded by an officer, but they have movement. They can go to the yard, to school, to a religious service, they can go to eat, but in this time all of those things have not happened."

Prison means constant surveillance, he said. Officers counted Mill seven times a day during his own time in prison. To endure difficult conditions in prison, inmates depend on following a routine.

"Lockdowns take you out of your routine. Prison is all about routine," he said. "If you get locked down in a situation like this with the fear that you can die, it will bring a complete disruption to your routine. Fear can set in. It can also paralyze you. That's where people commit suicide."

Lockdowns create a prison within the prison, he said.

"Officers go out to the parking lot and get a gun from their car and blow their brains out. It can bring you to the point of despair. And then you have no hope. If you have no hope, you have no life and no reason to live," Mill stressed.

COVID-19 blazes through the prison population four times faster than it goes through the rest of society. Prisoners can't escape the disease.

Since the pandemic began, more than 270,000 prisoners and more than 59,000 correctional employees have been infected with the coronavirus, according to the COVID Prison Project.

To give hope to these prisoners, Koinonia House created DVD videos that prisons could play for inmates. They also hosted online services that prisoners could attend by Zoom. Their most recent video, titled

"Dare to Hope," features worship music and testimonies from former prisoners on how they found Jesus. Mill's group also donated soap, shampoo, coats, backpacks and books to prisoners.

A former prisoner named Eddie testified in the ministry's video, "It was there in prison, where I rededicated my life to the Lord. The Bible tells you in 2 Corinthians 5:17 that if any man be in Christ, he's a new creation. It was that scripture that resonated in my heart."

When he became a Christian, his desires to do evil things left him.

"There is nothing too hard for God. Nothing too hard for God," he declared.

Mill said his ministry does not refer to prisoners by their last names to avoid attaching them to the shame of their crime.

Koinonia House finds various ways to help prisoners because group members love prisoners, said Mill.

"Love is creative," he said. "When we face a challenge, when we face a test, when we face a trial, love always triumphs. We have to love creatively. We have to find a way of loving."

Mill recently led a discipleship group of 36 people at Compass Church in Wheaton, Illinois. Ten attendees were on Zoom, some of whom were current prisoners.

Mill asked one man in prison for life, Joachim, to lead the closing prayer. Prisoners often feel lonely and forgotten by the outside world, Mill said.

"If you're a man [in prison], your wife will usually divorce you. Half of the men in prison never get a visitor. About 35% of them never get a piece of mail. They feel that they are forgotten. When they watch these videos, they know that they are being remembered. It's good to be remembered. That's why we send out Christmas cards," he said.

The Church often doesn't obey Jesus' commands to care for and visit prisoners, Mill lamented. Jesus said that His followers will be known because they visited prisons when others didn't. But most churches never even talk about prisoners.

"We are the Church. We are commanded by God's Word to be a voice to the voiceless. We cannot forget the prisoner," he said. "Therefore, if we're going to proclaim a credible Gospel, we have to include that Jesus Himself became a criminal. We must live a Gospel that includes the prisoner."

Christians can help prisoners by reading their Bibles and asking God to make them more compassionate, Mill said. Then they can work with local Christian groups that work with prisoners.

"Become sensitive. Become less judgmental. Know and think that everybody can make it to prison," he said. "When you bless the prisoner, God will open the gates of Heaven for you. That is when you make God the Father the happiest."





NO REGRETS

In 1904, young William Borden traveled the continents, feeling a growing burden for the world's hurting people. In his desire to be a missionary after college, he wrote two words in the back of his Bible:

"No Reserves"

Heir to the Borden Dairy fortune, he went to Yale University where he led Bible studies, and volunteered whenever he could. His motto during his college years was "Say 'no' to self and 'yes' to Jesus every time." Upon graduation from Yale, Borden turned down high-paying Job offers. In his Bible, he wrote two more words:

"No Retreats"

Borden went on to do graduate work at Princeton Seminary, and then promptly set sail for China. At a stopover in Egypt, he contracted spinal meningitis. Within a month, 25-year-old William Borden was dead. Was Borden's untimely death a waste? Not in God's perspective. Prior to his death, Borden had written two more words in his Bible. Underneath the words "No reserves" and "No retreats," he had written:

"No Regrets"

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Twitter Suspends Christian Magazine for Saying Biden's Trans Nominee Is A Man, Not A Woman By Brandon Showalter

Twitter has suspended a Christian magazine's account for reporting that one of President Joe Biden's nominees is a man who believes he's a woman.

The Daily Citizen, a publication of the Colorado Springs-based Focus on the Family, tweeted on Jan. 19 that Biden's nominee for assistant secretary of health, Rachel Levine, "is a transgender woman, that is, a man who believes he is a woman," along with a link to an article about the nomination.

As a result, the social media giant locked the magazine out of its account,

informing the publication that the tweet violated Twitter's user rules forbidding "hateful conduct."

The Daily Citizen appealed the suspension but was informed that its account will remain locked until it deletes the tweet.

Twitter wrote in a subsequent email to the magazine: "Hi The Daily Citizen, your account, @FocusCitizen has been locked for violating the Twitter Rules. Specifically for: Violating our rules against hateful conduct. You may not promote violence against, threaten, or harass other people on the basis of race, ethnicity, national origin, sexual orientation, gender, gender identity, religious affiliation, age, disability, or serious disease."

"Please note that repeated violations may lead to a permanent suspension of your account," the email said. "Proceed to Twitter now to fix the issue with your account."

The Daily Citizen said in its reply to Twitter that numerous media outlets have reported on the nomination and wrote in their articles that Levine was born male and remains a man who believes he is female. Levine has undergone elective cosmetic surgery and taken cross-sex hormones in an attempt to look more like a woman physically.

The magazine has insisted that it never promoted violence and rejected Twitter's claims that it violated its rules.

"As a Christian organization, we would never do so. We simply explained to our readers the appointment and defined what transgen-



der women are — those born male who believe they are a woman, regardless of whether they have had opposite-sex hormones or surgeries."

"We believe Twitter's blocking of this tweet and lockdown of our account discriminates against Focus on the Family's The Daily Citizen on the basis of our religious affiliation."

Twitter has persisted in its insistence that the publication violated its user rules and rejected the publication's appeal. The platform said the ban would not be overturned.

Big tech's censorship of voices who state biological facts in the context of transgender issues and policies has not been limited to religious or philosophically conservative accounts on the platform.

In November 2018, Twitter updated its policies to prohibit users from tweeting the birth names of trans-identifying people — which transgender activists refer to as "dead-naming" — or from using biologically accurate pronouns when tweeting about trans-identifying people.

Transgender advocates call the use of "he" to describe a male who identifies as female "misgendering." Both dead-naming and misgendering are akin to "abuse" and "violence," according to trans-activists.

For example, Twitter permanently booted radical feminist journalist Meghan Murphy from the platform after she tweeted that "men aren't women." Twitter took this action days before it instituted its trans-activist policy.

Murphy wrote in an editorial at the time that "while Twitter knowingly permits graphic pornography and death threats on the platform (I have reported countless violent threats, the vast majority of which have gone unaddressed), they won't allow me to state very basic facts, such as 'men aren't women."

"This is hardly an abhorrent thing to say, nor should it be considered 'hateful' to ask questions about the notion that people can change sex, or ask for explanations about transgender ideology," she said.

In February President Joe Biden participated in the 69th National Prayer Breakfast, which was held virtually this year due to the pandemic. The President shared a message of uniting around faith to tackle issues such as the pandemic, racial injustice, evictions, and hunger. Biden stated, "For me, in the darkest moments, faith provides hope and solace, faith provides clarity and purpose as well. It shows the way forward as one nation and a common purpose to respect one another." Biden, the nation's second Catholic president, quoted Psalm 30:5, "Weeping may endure for a night, but joy cometh in the morning (KJV)."

Focus on The Family Parenting Director Provides Tips On How To Raise Pro-Life Kids By Ryan Foley

As parents who believe in the sanctity of human life face challenges in their quest to raise pro-life children at a time when mainstream society is exposing kids to pro-abortion points of view, a parenting expert has shared tips on how pro-life parents can influence their kids from an early age.

As January marks Sanctity of Human Life Month, Dr. Joannie DeBrito, the director of parenting and youth at the Christian conservative organization Focus on the Family, spoke with The Christian Post on the 48th anniversary of the Roe v. Wade U.S. Supreme Court

decision that legalized abortion nationwide.

DeBrito, who is a mother and grandmother with over 30 years of experience as a parent educator and family life educator, assured that parents have the "greatest influence on their children" from the time they are young.

She encouraged pro-life parents to begin to "instill a value of all life" in their children from an early age. Instilling a value of life in children, she said, should go beyond teaching them the importance of pre-born life but life at "all ages."

This includes, she said, learning to value people who "might not be seen by some people as valuable" because they have disabilities or because of their old age.

"So, it's really helpful from the time your children are very young to instill that value of all life, that all life comes from God and is created by God and is valued by God," DeBrito said.

"And so we can do that by obviously allowing our kids to have exposure to a variety of people at different ages and people with disabilities and so forth, and modeling that we value them, and modeling that we recognize them as being valuable as well."

DeBrito shared a personal anecdote about the impact a girl with disabilities, who could not walk or talk, had on her daughter when she was younger.

"It had such an amazing impact on my daughter to actually sit and talk with her and hold her hand. And this little girl would respond to my daughter. She'd come up, and she'd say hi ... and say her name and stroke her," she remembers. "And this little girl would be staring off and then all of a sudden, she'd make eye contact with my daughter and smile. And my daughter would sing to her."

"My daughter from that point on ... just really had that sense of ... she is also a creation of the Lord and she is to be valued like everyone else," DeBrito added.

The Focus on the Family director suggested that parents should plant a seed with their small children as an important first step. As kids watch the seed turn into a plant, they learn the value of life that may seem insignificant at first.

"Finally starting to see that little piece of green poke through the dirt and eventually develop into a plant or a flower, that's a really great way to show that this teeny, tiny little seed that looked like it might be insignificant to the naked eye actually developed and blossomed into a beautiful plant or a beautiful flower," she detailed.

"If you look under a microscope maybe at cells as conception and fertilization has occurred, it may appear to someone as if that isn't life,



it's just a cluster of cells. But in fact, it's the beginning of a beautiful life and of God's creation of life. So, that's a great thing that you can do with kids who are younger."

DeBrito advised parents to also expose their children to other people "who might be struggling" by doing charitable activities such as serving at a soup kitchen.

"[T]hey begin to understand that even though people may be struggling, that doesn't necessarily mean that they aren't of value," she expounded.

DeBrito maintains that when it comes to teaching older children about abortion, it is best to stay ahead of the curve and expose them to the topic before they get to high school, where they may experience friends dealing with an unplanned pregnancy by "talking them through the kinds of things that might happen to people when they are dealing with an unplanned pregnancy."

One of those realities, she said, is that those faced with unplanned pregnancies will "choose abortion" or be "really encouraged to choose abortion."

"That's a great time to talk very openly with your children about abortion, what it is," DeBrito, who formerly served as director of university counseling services at Colorado Christian University, said.

Additionally, DeBrito stressed the importance of making sure that children know the consequences of abortion.

"Many, many people, probably a majority of people who have been impacted by an abortion either as a ... female who's terminated a pregnancy or a man who has been part of that decision go on to regret that decision to feel a lot of shame, a lot of guilt," she contends. "Sometimes, people get depressed, etcetera. So, it's not just the loss of that life, it's the damage that tends to be done for people who are impacted by abortion as well."

DeBrito warned that there can be physiological issues when it comes to abortion depending on what type of procedure is done.

"There are plenty of risks involved in abortions," she said. "And those are the kinds of things that are good to present to kids, obviously, as age-appropriate."

The exact age that a parent should introduce a child to the concept of abortion depends on "the maturity of the child," according to DeBrito.

Generally speaking, the Focus on the Family director concluded that an "upper elementary age is where you can talk about it a little bit more."

As a former director of counseling on a Christian college campus, De-Brito recounted arguments made by abortion advocacy groups that stuck with college students. One of the arguments was that the unborn child constituted nothing more than "a blob of tissue."

She considered such an argument to be a fallacy and dismissed it by circling back to the example of how a seed becomes a plant even when embedded in dirt within a Dixie cup. "It may look insignificant at the beginning but it grows into something beautiful. What if you had just looked at that and thrown that little seed in the trash?" she asked. "You would have never had what developed — the plant or the flower that blooms."



Russell Wilson Named Walter Payton NFL Man of The Year, Ouotes 1 Corinthians By Anugrah Kumar

Seattle Seahawks quarterback Russell Wilson paraphrased a line from the New Testament when he accepted the 2020 Walter Payton NFL Man of the Year Award for his COVID-19 relief efforts and other charitable causes during the pandemic.

"To America, to the world, love is patient, love is kind, love changes things," Wilson said, incorporating part of 1 Corinthians 13:4 into his acceptance speech during the NFL Honors show that aired on CBS the night before Super Bowl Sunday.



The award is given to a player in recognition of his "outstanding community service activities off the field, as well as excellence on it.'

Wilson recalled the impact his father, who passed away in 2010, had on his life.

"Dad, I can remember you telling me in the car one day, 'Son, love changes things.' Well, dad, you were right. I wish you were here to tell the world that in the toughest of times. 2020 was the most difficult time in history," Wilson stressed.

"Dad, I know one of your favorite athletes of all-time was Walter Payton. The player he was, but more importantly the man he was, the leader, the giver, the person. Man, dad, I wish you were here for this award," he added.

Wilson quoted Payton, the hall of fame running back who passed away in 1999, as once saying, "We are stronger together than we are alone."

"Dad, I think Walter was right," the Pro Bowl quarterback said. "To the young boy or girl who has a dream, who wants to make a difference. Remember this one thing: love always protects, always trusts, always hopes, always perseveres. Love changes things. Thank you."

The Walter Payton Man of the Year Award is one of the most prestigious honors given to an NFL Player. The award was established in 1970 to recognize excellence both on and off the field.

Every season, each of the NFLs 32 franchises nominates one player to receive the award. As the winner, a \$250,000 donation will be made to Russell and Ciara Wilson's Why Not You Foundation, founded in 2014 to fight poverty through education and youth empowerment.

With 2020 plagued by the COVID-19 pandemic, Wilson directed his charitable efforts toward feeding children, families and the elderly.

Early in the pandemic, Wilson and his wife, Ciara, donated 1 million meals to Feeding American and Food Lifeline. Wilson also launched the Meals Up campaign in partnership with the aviation company Wheels Up. The program raised the equivalent of more than 50 million meals, according to Seahawks.com.

Wilson's Why Not You Foundation partnered with Door Dash, Rockefeller Foundation and United Way Worldwide to bolster the Ride United initiative to deliver supplies and food to 175 communities nationwide.

"Our Why Not You Foundation will continue to lead with love," Wilson said in his speech. "We will keep fighting poverty through education and empowering the youth to have a 'why-not-you' attitude."

Wilson's charitable efforts are not new. As NFL.com reports, Wilson has visited Seattle Children's Hospital every Tuesday during the football season since his 2012 rookie season.

The 31-year-old star, who came to Christ as a teen, has been outspoken about his faith from the very beginning of his football career and regularly says he plays for a higher purpose.

"Jesus is love! At the end of the day, we are all looking for someone to comfort us, somebody to be there for us at all times," he said in a 2014 interview. "When we are at the worst times of our lives when we are battling with something, or struggles, whatever it may be, when we are at our highest point as well, when things are going really well, we want somebody to comfort us and be there for us and to say, 'Well done.' That's Jesus!"

NFL Star Sam Acho On Living Authentically for Christ: 'When God Gets The Glory, The World Thrives' By Leah MarieAnn Klett

Former Bears linebacker Sam Acho is on a mission to encourage Christians to live boldly and transparently for Christ in a world that promotes superficiality and deception.

"When God gets the glory, people around you benefit and the world around you thrives," Acho said during a recent interview on "The Crazy Happy Podcast," hosted by Pastor Daniel Fusco and Billy Hallowell.

"When you're who God created you to be, when you're not faking or pretending or hiding and you're using the gifts God gave youk He gets glory because of that," he continued.

After several years in the NFL, Acho is today the vice president of the NFL Players Association, a bestselling author, a philanthropist, and host of the "Athletes for Justice" podcast. Passionate about issues of justice and equality, the 32-year-old athlete often shares how his faith influences every area of his life.

The son of Nigerian immigrants, Acho grew up taking medical mission trips to Africa along with his family, including his brother and fellow NFL star Emmanuel Acho. Today, he carries on that tradition of service, serving as an ambassador for Living Hope Christian Ministries, which provides medical attention to local Nigerians.

"[For] our parents, the foundation was education, it was hard work, but also faith in Christ and faith in Jesus, saying, 'I don't care what circumstance you're in, God is greater than those circumstances,' which is why we did those medical missions trips to Nigeria," he recalled.

But living out his faith as an NFL star — a role he said he "fell into" through a series of



events - came at a "cost." Acho shared how, uncertain of how to boldly live out his faith in a highly competitive, sometimes violent sport, he would "hide."

"[But there was a] cost of hiding who I really was, not only on the football field but in the community," he admitted. Acho encouraged others who may be hiding who they are in Christ to live boldly, offering the reminder that God gave them certain gifts and talents "for a reason."

He did have a sharp mind and conversed with Mr. H regarding heaven and hell. Within 48 hours he declared his need for a Savior and received the eternal gift of salvation. Since none of us are medically equipped or trained, our friend Jacob had to go to ER and could not return to any of our homes.

"You can't please God and please man," he declared. "You can't serve God and serve your money or your fame or your fortune. Pick one or the other. The benefit of God is God ... He is the reward."

Acho recently released his latest book Let The World See You, which he clarified is "not an autobiography, but a book about what it means to be seen, known, and loved."

"It's a book for anybody who's ever felt ashamed, anybody who's ever felt like they had to hide for whatever reason," he said. "It's a book about what it means to be free so people around you benefit, and lastly the world around you thrives. When we all start being who God made us to be, the world will continue to thrive."

Acho explained that failing to live authentically often stems from the "fear of man," something Scripture repeatedly warns against.

"Jesus wants our companionship, wants our friendship," he said. "What I'm learning is that He loves us, He loves me, and not only does Jesus love me, Jesus likes us."

"I've always had this deep desire to be loved for who I really am," he said, "not for the things I can do, not for my highs ... but will you love me even in the bad?"

The athlete revealed that shortly before his friend died, he shared powerful words of advice with him that guide his thoughts and actions today.

REFRIED BEANS This bean recipe is "from scratch". Canned refried beans can be substituted.

1 pound dry pinto beans 1 1/2 tsp. cumin 1 1/2 tsp. chili powder 1/2 tsp. pepper 1 large onion chopped and saut ed 1-2 fresh garlic cloves, minced 1 1/4 tsp. salt

Sort pinto beans, checking for stones/ dirt. Wash in a strainer by running under cold water. Place beans in a pot, cover with water and soak overnight.

The next day, drain water. Cover beans with fresh water until just covered and cook until beans are soft and most of the water is absorbed, about 3 hours. Mash beans, leaving some whole. Combine remaining ingredients, stir to beans.

Serve beans over cooked rice, and top with shredded cheese, sliced green onions and chopped colored bell peppers.

group. "As we are teaching the kids about cartooning or other fun art techniques, the teens are becoming familiar with me and my fellow volunteers. They're getting to know an adult leader through a positive experience. There are moments when a teen will have a faith-based question, and now we're in proximity to really mentor, and guide them through areas where they're struggling. It's a positive experience for all involved."

While their faith motivates them to action, the West Sound YFC programs are open to young people of all backgrounds and beliefs. Through its programs, the ministry seeks to provide an environment for positive youth development thereby enabling these students to reach their full potential in life. There are three programs under the umbrella of West Sound YFC: Campus Life, Juvenile Justice, and Parent Life.

Having such a positive organization like West Sound YFC in the area is a blessing for the teens – and the adults. Many adult members of the local community have already offered to get involved in the various programs – but there is still so much needed. "Those in the area can offer prayers, volunteer with food/snack donations, volunteer with their time, or even providing financial support if they can," stated Daubenspeck. "We are always looking for community partners!"

Smith added to Daubenspeck's sentiments, "We are dealing with a somewhat heated political climate these days. Many neighbors in the community are at odds with each other when it comes to politics. But if the adults in the community can put their political differences aside, and come together to volunteer with us, they would see that they all agree on bringing hope to these teens. They'll be making a difference in the lives of these kids."

THE SCHOLAR'S CORNER: The Return of The Master

It used to be that one of the commonest sermons heard from evangelical pulpits dealt with the second advent of Christ. This may have been related to the freshness of a recently rediscovered doctrine, for example, the increased interest in evangelical theology which followed the rediscovery of the doctrine of justification by Luther. It may also have been related to the global terror of the wars and almost continuous rumors of wars as predicted in the Sacred Oracles. We have seen, to a lesser degree perhaps, a renewed interest in the doctrine of the second advent following the wars and global crises in our own times. However, in spite of such awesome global turbulence, today the doctrine of the second advent is heard less and less, although a variety of para-church ministries have filled this void in Biblical teaching and Christian experience.

It is clearly enunciated in Scripture that God's promise of "I will come again" must be viewed as certain as if it already had been fulfilled. It is also clear that the effect of the promise of Christ's return is to give Christians a hope which will be life modifying and transforming. If I really believe that Jesus will return it will change the way I live and work for the master.

The Advent of Christ for His Body The Church involved a hew revelation of the resurrection of those of His Body who are "dead in Christ". One highly respected scholar has written thus:

The resurrection of Jesus is the resurrection that all who are His, will likewise be raised. Until Paul received this revelation the only resurrection of the saints was the "resurrection unto life" (John 5:29) called the "former resurrection" (Rev. 20:5), at the beginning of the thousand year reign, after the judgment period. Then the Lord comes down, comes to earth.

The understanding of

some details of prophecy tends to be rather nebulous and subjective. No area of theological hermeneutics is so luculent an example of an old Irish adage, "Wonderful things in the Bible I see, many of them put there by you and by me". No area of theological or Biblical studies is so susceptible to subjectivism as Biblical prophecy.

Today the word "Rapture" has become commonplace as even non-Christians discuss "the end of the world" or "the end times". The word 'rapture' is not found in Scripture. It comes from the Latin word 'ruptio' used in the Latin Vulgate and is the translation of the Greek word for 'snatched away' in 1 Thessalonians 4. Here Paul gives us some previously cryptic details of what will occur when Christ returns and the impact it will have various companies both living and in repose. There are a number of raptures In Scripture such as that of Elijah (2 Kings 2), but the rapture that Paul depicts is perhaps the best known. It is important to note that while Scripture teaches that Christ will return and set his feet on the Mount of Olives (Zechariah 14;4) this occurrence is not what is described and revealed in 1 Thessalonians 4, where the new revelation given to Paul is that Christ will return 'to the atmosphere' and will rapture or snatch away a special group of the redeemed, namely, those who are members of the Body of Christ, and will usher them into the presence or 'parousia' of Christ. Contemporaneously those who have previously fallen asleep in Jesus will be resurrected with spiritual and sensate bodies and will join the ascending throng. A significant amount of confusion has arisen from failure to recognize that I Thessalonians chapter 5 verse 1 begins an description of events which will occur after the rapture of the body of Christ has been accomplished.

It is worthwhile to note that the word used to describe the 'coming of Christ' is 'parousia' or 'presence' This reminds us that the 'coming' is only the mechanics or activity which places us in the presence of Christ Himself, our hope, our expectation, and our joy. It is when He shall have arrived that His presence shall be enjoyed by those who meet Him in the upper atmosphere. There is a natural tendency for humans to want to know more details than what God has revealed. This can be a snare in the fantasies of the mind based on a foundation of corrupted hermeneutics or psychological wish fulfillment of a 'wanna-be' expositor focusing on fantasied imaginations which have nothing to do with sacred scripture. This type of incompetence is seen most often in attempts to exegete the Apocalypse, often resulting in the development of various cults seen today. The aim and responsibility of the student of Scripture is to learn all that God has revealed and to add nothing from our own biases or imaginations.

Having said this it is important to point out that there is a diversity of views and a plethora of opinions on the chronology of the events subsequent to the rapture and precipitating The Tribulation period. Some excellent scholars and respected exegetes believe that the Rapture will occur before The Great Tribulation, some during this period and some at the close of this period of judgment. This is not something to fight about as long as we believe that He is coming again!

Similarly, some good men believe different details on the various judgments cataloged in Scripture and the ushering in the 1000 year of Christ on the earth, which will be a period of relative peace. Even this period which will have enjoyed rule by the Master Himself will terminate in a rebellion as a last gasp of the devil and his hordes. We have no need to be concerned because the future will hold a new heaven and a new earth for this abused planet and the ultimate consummation when God will be All in All. Should it surprise us that the last words of Scripture are "Even so come Lord Jesus"?

ADF TO US SUPREME COURT: AMERICANS SHOULD BE FREE TO SUPPORT CAUSES WITHOUT HARASSMENT

Alliance Defending Freedom attorneys representing a Michigan-based nonprofit filed their first brief recently with the U.S. Supreme Court since it agreed to hear the case Thomas More Law Center v. Becerra. The high court agreed to hear the case after the U.S. Court of Appeals for the 9th Circuit ruled that Thomas More Law Center—and all other nonprofits who solicit donations in California—must disclose the names and addresses of major donors to the California attorney general on an annual basis.

The 9th Circuit's ruling reversed a district court's decision following a trial, which found that the California attorney general's office has no compelling need for the information. In addition, the office publicly exposed confidential donor information on the internet and created a perfect target for hackers by uploading thousands of confidential documents to the cloud, where they were easily discovered.

During a Sunday school lesson, a child learned about how God created human beings. The child became especially focused



REPORT: CHINA LEADERS FEAR CHRISTIAN POPULATION MAY REACH 300 MILLION BY 2030

According to the Christian charity Open Doors, the prospect that China's Christian community could reach a staggering 300 million people by 2030 has unnerved communist leaders who fear "they'll

have to share power" as the Church increases in size and influence. The Chinese Communist Party, led by President Xi Jinping, is becoming increasingly concerned about the Christian population's growth and is cracking down on religion as a result.

KENYA: ARSONISTS BURN FIVE CHURCH BUILDINGS

Unidentified arsonists in western Kenya burned five church buildings and threw feces at their smoldering ruins, Morning Star News reports. All of the crimes were carried out from January 20 to January 24 in Otamba village, in the Nyaraibari Chache area of Kisii County.

St. Monica Church's building was burned on January 20, Morning Star News reports. On January 21, arsonists burned the Seventh-day Adventist Worldwide Church buildings and the Legio Maria building. Then, on January 24, arsonists burned the building of a 250-member Pentecostal Church, Morning Star News reports. Daniel Ratemo, chairman of the Pentecostal Church has reportedly asked for financial support and prayers.



Speaking to Morning Star News about the spate of attacks, a local source said: "Apart from setting the churches ablaze, the arsonists also committed the heinous acts of scooping human feces onto the buildings to discourage the faithful from attending their ruined churches." Damage valued at millions of Kenyan shillings has been done to the

buildings and furniture, the source added.

CALIFORNIA CHURCHES FREE TO MEET INDOORS AFTER US SUPREME COURT ORDER ON COVID-19 RESTRICTIONS

The following quote may be attributed to Alliance Defending Freedom Senior Counsel and Vice President of U.S. Litigation David Cortman regarding the U.S. Supreme Court's decision in South Bay United Pentecostal Church v. Newsom and order in Harvest Rock Church v. Newsom that halt California Gov. Gavin Newsom's COVID-19 restrictions preventing churches and other religious congregations from meeting indoors as other groups are permitted to do. The decision and order

also allow churches to present new evidence in district court that the governor's 25% capacity limitation and other restrictions are not being applied at least equally with other activities:

"The Supreme Court's decision is a significant win for ensuring that government officials do not exceed their authority by bypassing the First Amendment when implementing coronavirus restrictions. Churches in the state may once again meet indoors, and the justices indicated that the other restrictions to which religious gatherings are wrongly subjected may face significant legal and constitutional hurdles going forward. Gov. Newsom has a duty to respect the First Amendment, so he can't single out church worship services and other religious meetings for the draconian COVID-19 restrictions that many secular activities haven't faced in California. The Supreme Court is reinforcing what it has affirmed in previous orders: Disparate treatment is both illogical and unconstitutional."

INTERNATIONAL EVANGELIST LUIS PALAU PASSES AWAY

Luis Palau, the international evangelist who preached the Gospel of Jesus Christ to more than 1 billion people through media and evangelistic events, died March 11th, his family confirmed. The 86-year-old preacher, a close friend of the late evangelist Billy Graham, passed away after a decision to stop all treatment for his incurable lung cancer.



Abraham Hamilton, III Examines Why America Has Stopped Believing in God

American Family Radio Host of 'The Hamilton Corner': 'Almost All of It Is Attributable to Education'

Abraham Hamilton, III, host of The Hamilton Corner radio program on American Family Radio, is passionate about discovering the root cause of America's cultural demise. A grave concern and recent show topic was "Why America Has Stopped Believing in God." Hamilton

points to Lyman Stone's American Enterprise Institute research. "Religious conservatives would probably cite the loosening of the country's morals that began in the sixties and seventies," says Hamilton, American Family Association (AFA, www.afa.net) general counsel and public policy analyst. "Secular progressives might mutter something about the onward March of science and reason over time. But the data seemed to show that the main driver of secularization in the United States has been an acceleration of government spending on education and government control over the curricular content taught in schools."

"Now the study wasn't focusing on American education," explains Hamilton. "The study was based on the effort to determine statistically and with empirical analysis, how did America become so secularized? The facts drove the American Enterprise Institute researchers toward education. I have said numerous times education is discipleship. The concept of separating academic matriculation and the spiritual development is an unbiblical concept.

"And I know there are exceptions to this. There are godly men and women who are teaching in schools across our country. And there are people, children who have become faithful to Jesus Christ surviving these government indoctrination centers. But if we were to be honest, we would have to admit that those are exceptions and not the rule. And one of the evidences of this normalization of godlessness is that we often endeavor to try to treat the exceptions as if they are the rule, but it is high time for us to be honest as to what's happening in our country, we didn't get here overnight."

Stone cites the seminal work of Raphael Franck and Laurence Iannaccone on this point, who meticulously tracked religious behavior over time in their own work. According to Franck and Iannaccone, "higher educational attainment did not predict lower religiosity: More and less educated people are similarly religious." Nor did they "find that industrialized, urban life reduces religiosity: A more urban and industrialized population was associated with greater religiosity." The link between intellectual progression/modernization and secularization is non-existent.

Stone's data suggests that, by and large, kids brought up in religious households stay religious and kids who are not, do not. Consequently, childhood religiosity has been, and remains, the most important indicator of America's religious trajectory. The story of religious decline in America is not the story of adults consciously rejecting the faith of their forefathers: It is the story of each generation receiving a more secular upbringing than the generation preceding it. What accounts for this secularization of childhood over time? Taxpayer dollars.

"American secularization did not occur because those who are overtly atheist and agnostic continued to proliferate in American society," Hamilton explains. "Through the secularization of education, Satan

> has gained entree into the church and carried off as captives the offspring born into Christian families. Each generation in America within the family became more and more secularized among the ranks of the church attending."


According to Stone, children learn more at school than reading, writing, and arithmetic. The government run education system imbibes a whole set of implied assumptions about what is important in life by excluding religious instruction from public schools. The education system tacitly teaches students that religious commitments are not a first order priority in life.

"We must have our eyes targeted toward the root, not merely the fruit," Hamilton says. "What do you think the consequences will be? If generation after generation of Americans are taught that God is nothing more than a take it or leave it proposition when He himself says, 'I am the Lord, your God, you shall have no other gods before Me.' By excluding religious instruction from public schools, the government run education system tacitly teaches students that religious commitments are not a first order priority in life. Faith in God becomes a sort of optional weekend hobby akin to playing tennis or video games."

The content of education matters, Stone reported. Evidence that education reduces religiosity is fairly weak: American religiosity rose considerably from 1800 until the 1970s, despite rapidly rising educational attainment. But the evidence that specifically secular education might reduce religiosity is more compelling. Indeed, statistically, most researchers who have explored long-run change in religiosity find that education-related variables, which Stone has argued are a proxy for secular education, can explain nearly the totality of change in religiosity.

"All the changes that many of us have witnessed in the moral fiber of America, the Christ receptivity versus the Christ diversion, almost all of it is attributable to education.

"There has been a normalized godlessness to such a degree in our country. We've been all too willing and comfortable to abide in that godlessness – so it's only a matter of time to when the rebellion says, 'Oh, so you all are comfortable with that? Let's just push a little further.' We didn't get here overnight. There's only one way out to repentance."



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
