






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Shepherd or Sheep?

Faith-based adoption agencies that operate under a biblical understanding of family would be forced to violate their beliefs or shut down adoption services.



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
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A Word From the Heart

The Apostle Paul wrote a letter to his fellow worker Titus. It is a short letter. What relevance could a letter from an aging missionary, to a little known co-worker, written to a new small church, have for us in 2021? We know almost nothing about the founding of the church on the isle of Crete. Paul stopped there and after seeing the problems, he left Titus there to help this new group of people get started on the right foot. (1:5) We do know this church lived in a cultural environment of lazy liars who lived for self and enjoyed bringing in ideas that would divide households and harm the local church. Titus was to teach them important lasting truths that would allow this small church to carry on for God's glory.



The first most important need, was to help recog-

nize spiritual leaders. The qualifications for these men can be found throughout the New Testament letters. This group might, as so many of us do, imitate the world's standard of leadership. (1:5-9, Matt. 20:25-28) Unless godly spirit-given character was recognized, they could easily be hoodwinked by those who brought in Cretan standards. The leaders must be able to use God's word as their final authority. Paul says, "holding fast the faithful word as he has been taught." (1:9) Don't miss the impact of this statement. The leaders first of all, had to be taught the Word of God. They must be teachable and accept the authority that the scriptures have over their lives and leadership in the church. Spiritual leaders must know God's word.

This is their only standard of soundness This is their only weapon for combat.

The church on Crete already had teachers who were not willing to submit to the authority of sound teaching. Paul told Titus to rebuke them (1:13) that they may be sound in the faith Although we might call some of them legalistic (1:10) their real motive was for selfish gain.

Paul's first point of instruction to the new church is vital for today's local church as well. Soundness of spiritual leadership is based upon spiritual character and a proper attitude toward God's word.

Are our leaders people who can meet the standards of 1:5-7? Have they not only shown a good grasp of God's word, but are they submissive to its authority?

Is God's word given as the basis for sound living, or have our cultural norms taken its place?

These are instructions for the whole group and not only leaders. They are teachings for older men, and older women, young women, and young men, as well as for Titus, who must lie the things he teaches. Chapter 3 teaches us our role and attitude toward rulers and authorities and how we are to live among the world around us.

Reading Titus is a nifty outline for study. The subjects mentioned in Titus are found in other epistles and often in detail.

WHAT IS TRUTH?: FELLOWSHIP OF CHRISTIAN ATHLETES URGES CHRISTIANS TO PURSUE TRUTH IN GOD'S VOICE AND WORD

In life, we are always pursuing something – relationships, promotions, meaning and accolades. Our human nature craves success. But to measure our success, we must know the standard and our anchoring point.

The 2021 theme of the Fellowship of Christian Athletes (FCA, www.fca.org) is 'Pursue' and will explore what it means to pursue Truth, Life, Team and Mission. Each of these themes connect to engage in intentional pursuit of God and His great call on His children's lives (or on the lives of His followers).

"For this, we start at the root of things: truth," said FCA President and CEO Shane Williamson. "Truth comes to us in many forms from many people and ideas. We wonder what is right and if there really is a standard of one specific truth over everything else. And we dedicate effort and pursuit into finding what and how we believe. We seek it because our souls want certainty.

"If we feel uncertainty within us, it's because there is something more to our days. There is Someone who knows our name and has shown us a way in which to live that brings truth to life. Jesus Christ brings us to the Father and sets the standard for how we love our neighbor, respect ourselves and seek first the will of God that has been already reconciled through the blood of His Son."

In just a few short sentences, Jesus points all toward truth: "I am the way, the truth, and the life. No one can come to the Father except through me." (John 14:6) In a world that can make many feel as if they don't know where they are going, Jesus grafts a greater Truth as His followers make a point to learn more about God through His Word.

FCA explains that if Christians want to improve their skills in their sport, it only makes sense to spend time practicing, studying the game, and taking care of themselves to become better. In the same way, spiritual training should be exercised if Christians want to grow in Christ. Therefore it is important to be in God's Word every day.

According to FCA, the first layer of pursuing truth is to read the truth. "How do we read truth? By pursuing God's voice, which He shares with us in His Word, the Bible. The more we read the truth of God, the more natural it will be brought into our daily life. It's important to know why we believe what we do, and the Bible centers us in the unchanging certainty of God."

CA Churches Permanently Quarantine Governor Newsom

Recently a California District Court entered an order approving Liberty Counsel's settlement of the lawsuit on behalf of Harvest Rock Church and Harvest International Ministry against California Gov. Gavin Newsom. The full and final settlement was approved by the District Court and thus is the first state-wide permanent injunction

- July 13, 2020 April 8, 2021: No worship for over 90 percent of California
 - April 9, 2021 April 12, 2021: Restrictions on home Bible study lifted but not on singing and chanting

in the country against COVID restrictions on churches and places of worship.

This is the first state-wide permanent injunction in the country against COVID restrictions on churches and places of worship. Under the agreed state-wide permanent injunction, all California churches may hold worship without discriminatory restrictions.

Under the settlement, California may no longer impose discriminatory restrictions upon houses of worship. The governor must also pay Liberty Counsel \$1,350,000 to reimburse attorney's fees and costs.



The settlement references several Supreme Court opinions, including Harvest Rock Church v. Newsom, that include a long list of similar nonreligious activity the High Court set forth as comparable gatherings. These include grocery stores, warehouses, big box stores, transportation, infrastructure, telecommunications, and much more. In other words, churches and places of worship may never again have discriminatory restrictions placed on them that are not equally applied to a long list of "critical infrastructure" or "essential services" as outlined in several Supreme Court precedents cited in the settlement agreement.

Pastor Ché Ahn, founder of Harvest Rock Church and Harvest International Ministry, received a letter from the Pasadena Criminal Prosecutor threating him, the staff, and anyone who attends church with daily criminal charges each up to one year in prison, and daily fines of \$1,000. Despite this intense opposition, Pastor Ahn stood against these unconstitutional executive orders. He risked criminal charges and fines, as did those who worked for the church and those who attended. Thanks to his leadership, every church in California is now free.

Newsom originally imposed the most severe restrictions on churches and even home Bible studies and worship in the nation. Now after multiple reprimands from the U.S. Supreme Court, including two on behalf of Harvest Rock Church and Harvest International Ministry, Gov. Newsom will be the first governor in America to have a permanent injunction against him on behalf of houses of worship.

This case involved three emergency injunctions pending appeal at the Ninth Circuit Court of Appeals, two oral arguments before a panel of three judges, two orders from the U.S. Supreme Court, including an injunction pending appeal issued by the High Court on February 5, 2021.

The timeline for actions regarding California's worship restrictions include:

- March 19, 2020 May 25, 2020: No Worship
- May 26, 2020 July 12, 2020: 25 percent capacity but no more than 100 people

• April 13, 2021 – May 9, 2021: Mandatory attendance limits are lifted

• May 17, 2021 – and Forever: Discriminatory restrictions on churches permanently removed

Under the settlement agreement, discriminatory restrictions on worship and religious gatherings may no longer be applied to churches and places of worship.

Last year, the U.S. Supreme Court granted an emergency petition for an injunction pending appeal on behalf of New York City syna-

gogues and Roman Catholic churches in Roman Catholic Diocese of Brooklyn v. Cuomo and Agudath Israel v. Cuomo. On December 3, 2020, the High Court granted the petition by Harvest Rock Church and Harvest International Ministry, setting aside all the lower court orders and directing them to follow its ruling in Roman Catholic Dioceses. When the lower courts refused to strike down California's restrictions, the case returned to the Supreme Court.

On February 5, 2021, the U.S. Supreme Court ruled in favor of Harvest Rock Church and Harvest International Ministry by enjoining California's total ban on indoor worship. This was the second time Liberty Counsel appealed to the High Court on behalf of these churches. The ruling also included South Bay United Pentecostal Church.

On April 9, the U.S. Supreme Court granted an emergency injunction pending appeal in Tandon v. Newsom and ruled that Gov. Newsom's restrictions on home Bible study and worship violate the First Amendment.

Pastor Ché Ahn said, "This is a momentous day for churches in America! After nearly a yearlong battle defending our religious freedoms, our lawsuit has reached a permanent settlement in our favor. I am thrilled to see the complete reversal of the last discriminatory restrictions against churches in California, knowing this case will act as a precedent, not only in our state, but also in our nation. We are incredibly grateful to our attorney Mat Staver and to Liberty Counsel for their relentless support and fierce determination. Most of all, we give all the glory to God for moving mightily in this historic season!"

Liberty Counsel Founder and Chairman Mat Staver said, "Governor Gavin Newsom's COVID restrictions intentionally discriminated against churches while providing preferential treatment to many secular businesses and gatherings. The Supreme Court intervened multiple times to provide relief. California may never again place discriminatory restrictions on churches and places of worship. Gov. Gavin Newsom has now been permanently quarantined and may not violate the First Amendment rights of churches and places of worship again. We are grateful for Pastor Ché Ahn, Harvest Rock Church, and Harvest International Ministry. Pastor Ahn's leadership and courage has toppled the tyranny and freed every pastor and church in California."

The Most Difficult Day of the Year

Every year immediately after Easter Sunday, there is an advertising blitz that appears everywhere on TV, radio, through social media, in print, written communications, and even on billboards which focuses upon a special day for mothers. Some churches have only the mothers stand and acknowledge each with flowers or applause. In pre-COVID days, Mother's Day was often the most popular day at restaurants and buffets with the highest recorded sales all year. However, there is another sobering aspect to this day which is often overlooked.

After serving over 20 years with a caseload of clients at ECFA (Evangelical Child & Family Agency), a caring pro-life ministry to moms, dads, babies, children, preborn and also women and men hoping to adopt, I appreciated what I learned from so many wonderful clients in both programs. Mother's Day can be the most difficult day of the year for many reasons.

1) women who aborted their child(ren) recognize at some point in their life they were a mom for a period of time and ache with regret of their permanent decision

2) birth moms who completed their pregnancy and unselfishly chose to place their baby for adoption with a couple, struggle with not being able to freely acknowledge their role of motherhood in certain settings yet, have the same need to be honored and valued

3) women who have had their children removed by Protective Services never feel quite confident to be a mother and struggle in that role and also in forming a healthy relationship with their child

4) single women who have not married and serve God with their lives are often made to feel less than whole because they haven't birthed a child

5) married women who have had medical situations or are unable to conceive or carry a child to term often feel shame after callous or flippant statements are shared by insensitive or unknowing family and friends

6) women whose child, regardless of age or circumstance, was buried before them, yearn deeply for that child and often experience sorrow as the May date approaches

7) an adult whose mother died unexpectedly this past year and doesn't have the necessary closure of a goodbye because of no funeral service due to COVID restrictions

These are only a few examples of the women who are not particularly joyous on this day and may need extra encouragement, compassion, and understanding so that it's not so difficult. Perhaps they need to share with you how hard this day is for them and desire you to be sensitive by listening then expressing the love, grace, and heart of God to them.

This day may also be extremely difficult for a child, regardless of age, who feels the annual sting of abandonment or even the vivid memories of emotional, physical, or sexual abuse. For so many reasons this could be a devastating day.

In Psalm 27:7- 10, God's Word can be a source of comfort and healing for all: "Hear O Lord, when I cry aloud; be gracious to me and answer me! Your face Lord, do I seek. For my father and my mother have forsaken me, but the Lord will take me in."

There is only one comforting solution for anyone who finds this day particularly difficult. It is God! He is the One who sees, hears, and offers His compassion to all who need consoling.

Montana Passes State Religious Freedom Restoration Act Despite Opposition From 250 Companies by Michael Gryboski

Montana passed a state-level version of the Religious Freedom Restoration Act, joining nearly two dozen other states with similar religious freedom protections.

Gov. Greg Gianforte signed Senate Bill 215 recently, requiring that state agencies will need to show a "compelling governmental interest" to interfere with a person's religious beliefs.

A spokesperson for the Governor's Office told the Montana Standard that Gianforte signed the bill "to protect the freedom of people of all faiths to exercise their sincerely held religious beliefs."

"Montana joins 21 other states with RFRA laws, where it has historically been used to allow Native American children to wear braids in school, Sikhs to wear turbans in the military, and Christian employers to refuse to cover abortions under their health insurance policies," the spokesperson said.

Under the RFRA bill, "state action should not burden exercise of religion without compelling justification" and through "the least restrictive means of furthering that compelling governmental interest."

The bill is modeled off of the federal RFRA law passed by Congress in 1993 with overwhelmingly bipartisan support. That bill was signed into law by Democrat President Bill Clinton.

Matt Sharp, senior counsel with the Alliance Defending Freedom, which actively supported the legislation, celebrated the passage.

"This law provides a sensible balancing test for courts to use when reviewing government policies that infringe upon the religious freedom rights of Montanans," said Sharp.

"The law doesn't automatically decide who will win every disagreement, but it does ensure that every Montanan — regardless of belief system or political power — receives a fair hearing when government action forces a person to violate his or her religious beliefs."



Although the Montana RFRA makes no mention of sexual orientation or gender identity, many claimed that the legislation will lead to discrimination against the LGBT community and others.

In an action alert, the Montana chapter of the American Civil Liberties Union claimed that the RFRA law would allow religious schools to fire unmarried pregnant teachers, businesses to deny insurance coverage for birth control products and bakeries to refuse catering gay weddings.

"This measure could undermine non-discrimination, child welfare, public safety, and public health laws and set Montana up for a flood of expensive litigation from those who claim they have a religious right to violate these laws," the progressive legal nonprofit group stated.

In March, more than 250 national and Montana-based businesses, including Amazon, Google Molson Coors Beverage Co. and Verizon, signed a letter in protest against this and other pieces of legislation they argue will "unnecessarily single out already marginalized groups for more mistreatment, harassment, and discrimination."

Indiana Gov. Eric Holcomb Signs Law Designating Churches as Essential Services, Banning Government Mistreatment

Indiana Gov. Eric Holcomb signed a new law that prohibits the state government and its agencies from treating a religious body worse during a public health emergency than secular entities.

"Religious organizations provide essential services that are necessary for the health and welfare of the public during a disaster emergency," reads SEA 263 in part. "[T]he state and a political subdivision may not impose restrictions on ... the operation of a religious organization; or ... religious services that are more restrictive than the restrictions imposed on other businesses and organizations that provide essential services to the public."

The new law clarifies that it "does not prohibit the state or a political subdivision from requiring a religious organization to comply with a generally applicable health, safety, or occupancy requirement that is neutral towards religious organizations and equally applicable to any organization or business that provides essential services."

"However, the state or political subdivision may not enforce any health, safety, or occupancy requirement that imposes a substantial burden on a religious service unless the state or political subdivision demonstrates that applying the burden to the religious service in this particular instance is essential to further a compelling governmental interest and is the least restrictive means of furthering that compelling governmental interest," it continued.

Alliance Defending Freedom's legal counsel Greg Chafuen issued a statement Friday in support of the new law, saying that "religious organizations provide soul-sustaining operations that are essential to our society and protected by the First Amendment."

"While public officials have the authority and responsibility to protect public health and safety, the Supreme Court has made clear that the First Amendment 'cannot be put away and forgotten' even in a pandemic," Chafuen said.

"We commend Gov. Holcomb and the Indiana Legislature for making it clear that officials cannot use a public crisis to discriminate against religious operations."

Authored by Indiana state Sen. Eric Koch in January, the bill passed the state House of Representatives by a vote of 74–20 and then the Senate by a vote of 36–10.

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



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
Chance Meeting on Bus Leads Liberty Students To Discover They Once Lived Together In The Same Orphanage In China

An unassuming bus ride across Liberty University's campus April 14 became a perfect example of how God can miraculously connect people across continents and make the world seem small. Two students — sophomore Ally Cole and freshman Ruby Wierzbicki — started their ride as strangers but soon uncovered a shared past that goes back to an orphanage in China 15 years ago.

Boarding a crowded bus across campus to her class in Marie F. Green Hall, Cole sat in an open seat next to Wierzbicki and struck up some small talk. Wierzbicki said she was from New Jersey but was adopted from China, and Cole said she was also adopted from China and grew up in Maryland. At first, they thought it was just a coincidence. But then they noted that they came from the same city of Jinan and both pulled up a photo from the orphanage they were adopted from as young children (the Jinan Social Welfare Institute) on their phones. A photo of Wierzbicki on a red and blue slide that looked familiar to Cole proved to be the moment of realization.

"We held the photos side by side on our phones and we realized that everything matched, and we knew that it had to be the same place," Wierzbicki said.

Their bus dropped them off and the girls stepped off to the side of the crowd to continue sharing photos and uncover just how much their paths had crossed back in Jinan. As it turns out, they were adopted one week apart (Cole was 6 and Wierzbicki was 4) and could even identify themselves standing side-by-side in certain photos.



"We started scrolling through our photos on our phones, and I realized that Ruby had a lot of photos of me that I'd never seen before and photos where we were together," Cole said. "We even had a mutual friend from the orphanage, Emma, that we each had photos with."

As they retraced each of their journeys from China to the United States, from their individual home states to Virginia, and even from the different places they frequent on a campus swarming with more than 15,000 students to how they landed in neighboring seats on the same bus, Wierzbicki (an exercise science student) and Cole (studying graphic design) acknowledge that their meeting was no accident.

"There are people I've talked to about this and they've said, 'What a coincidence.' But we think that this is 100% God," Wierzbicki said. "There's no way that two people who were in the same orphanage in a different country can somehow end up at the same school at the same time and have it

not be God."

Cole said that this experience has helped her develop a better idea of what her past in China was like, which is something that she has had an interest in for a while, and that she has enjoyed digging through it all with Wierzbicki.

"I don't know much about my past, which is something I've always been OK with, but at the same time a part of me has always wondered about it," Cole said. "I think God is so amazing for doing all of this. I think of it as a blessing because not a lot of people who are adopted get to know a whole lot about their past, but (we) got to do that by sharing our photos and talking about it."

Hungary Rescues Syrian Christians

An archbishop in war-torn Syria has thanked Hungary for enabling hundreds of Christians to return to their homes, Hungary's government said.

Jean Abdo Arbach, the Melkite Greek Catholic Archbishop of Homs, Hama, and Yabroud, reportedly writes that "200 Syrian families could return home."

He made the announcement in a letter to Hungarian Prime Minister Viktor Orbán, the press office confirmed.

"The Hungarian government-

provided financing to renew two Christian youth centers and 200 homes," the bishop was quoted as writing. The properties were "destroyed in violent clashes in the region since 2011," the letter added.

Hungary is one of the first countries with a government office dedicated to persecuted Christians.



The government says that Hungary, with less than one percent of the world's population, spent up to \$50 million helping Christians, one of the most persecuted minorities.

Critics argue, however, that the authorities appear reluctant to accept Christian refugees in Hungary. Relatively few Christians, including those from Syria and Iran, received asylum or shelter here, Worthy News established.

However, Tristan Azbej, Hungary's secretary for aiding persecuted Christians, defended the reluctance to take on refugees.

He says rather than "encouraging persecuted communities to leave their homelands, help should be taken where the problems arise."

Azbej also urged the world to not forget "about those for whom the coronavirus seems like the lesser evil compared with the existential crisis they are forced to face every

He recently told an online conference that the number of Christians facing persecution globally rose from 245 million to 260 million within a year.

day."



Simon The Cyrenian by David Peter Oblak

In Luke chapter 23, verse 26, as well as Matthew and Mark, there is the historical account of Simon, the Cyrenian who had just come into town, and was ordered by a Roman soldier to help Jesus by carrying His cross. I love this story because I believe there is an application here for all of us. In some ways, Simon embodies some of the same characteristics as that of the good Samaritan.



He represents that person, who, like in Galations 6, is requested to help bear another's burdens.

There are many, many people in this life with good hearts, who face crushing burdens of grief, trauma, loss, abuse, PTSD, shell shock, along with many other painful experiences For example, combat Vets often return home from the war and yet the horrors and memories of combat haunt their lives in ways that others don't understand.

These men and women who have served our country, have in many cases, been ignored or avoided by church people, who are put off by their sometimes rough demeanor. Many often have sought relief and escape from their inner pain through alcohol and drugs They long for peace but a war rages on inside their badly damaged hears and souls.

Time does not permit a listing of all the kinds of trauma and abuse some have experienced but let us consider those in this society who have suffered from horrible wounds of fear, shame and isolation as a result of a violent and abusive childhood, or a rape, or sexual abuse from a family member, or a pastor or a priest.

These are the kinds of people (and there are so many other scenarios) who desperately need someone to come along and if necessary at times, carry their 'cross' for them. This, I believe, is the primary mission of the church. Jesus Himself bore a cross. A cross that was in actual fact, our cross. Your cross, my cross-but not a cross that He ever deserved to have to carry. And yet, in our case, Jesus Himself became our Simon the Cyrenian when He took our cross upon Himself, because the crushing weight of all our sin, shame and condemnation was a load impossible for us to bear. And, unlike Simon who was forced to carry the Master's cross, Jesus willingly came along, looked into my broken shattered life, at my broken, slashed and bleeding heart, and said, "My brother, this cross of yours is too much for you to bear. Give it to me and I'll finish the job." And of course He did. He died on my cross, on your cross, on our cross and made it His own. He even made sure that all my sins, all my failures, my transgressions, my doubts, my fears, my shame-all of the "ordinances" that were against me, the list of every single charge or accusation that could be named against me and gladly—yes gladly—made it His own. (See Col. 2:14,15) And He did it because there was no way in hell- yes hell-that I could survive the eternal cross I was destined to carry alone, if it were not for My cross bearer taking my load upon Himself.

And the scripture says that He did this for the joy that was set before Him, because He knew that after the cross, comes the tomb—the rest stop for Jesus—before He launched a spiritual nuclear detonation in the bowels of hell itself. When He rose from the dead, He took all of the guilt, shame, sin and disgrace—the ugliest of the ugly—made His body the delivery system, blew death itself away, and handed the devil himself the only thing that remained—the entire weight of it all—the weight of the entire human race's sin, with all its eternal consequences and dumped it in the lap of Satan and said: Here—I believe this mess belongs to you—forever Lucifer, now Mr. Beelzebub."

"You wanted to be like The Most High. Well you got it-at least in the one aspect about Him that you failed to realize until it was too late. When you brought sin into the world-you Satan became its author, its origination, and with it you brought death to my children. I took their death sentence upon Myself so the payment has been paid in full-but for you Satanthe list of all the offenses for all time, for all mankind, is nailed to a cross for you that looks very much like a lake of fire. For you see, O great and mighty prince

of darkness—that only God Almighty Himself is capable and powerful enough to bear the full wrath of sin against Himself and not be consumed or destroyed by it. But you devil—by trying to be like God—you get to bear HIs eternal wrath forever because to be quite frank about it, you were just too pathetically weak to finish what you started." What a fool the evil one is. The created one actually thought he could outsmart his maker. Satan bruised Jesus' heal and got his own head crushed in the process—hardly a fair fight if you ask me.

Thanks be to God who gives us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ (1 Cor 15:57).

Now, let's get back to our application about Simon. In this world, we pass by people every day. People of all ages, shapes, colors, sizes. Men, women, children who, like us, have their own lifelong burdens of fear, regret, shame, nightmare memories of incidents long past, but never forgotten. Some people who we cross paths with are trying their best some days just to survive, to go another day and fight the urge to just quit, to do something incredibly stupid, or even end it all. They are, in their hearts and souls, just like the Lord Jesus on that road to Golgatha.

And just like the Lord Jesus, they need people like you and I to come along side and say, "Here, let me help you with that cross of yours. I like you, my brother, have a cross to carry but I see that right now, yours is so much heavier than mine." "Bear ye one another's burdens and so fulfill the love of Christ (Gal. 6:2).

I the author of this story, know how it feels to be crushed to the breaking point, to fail miserably, even as a child of God. There have been several times in my life—like in the aftermath of three suicides in my family in a five year period—that the weight of grief, the guilt over the coulda, woulda, shoulda kind of stuff that comes on the heels of such traumatic events as these. It was in those times, that I desperately wanted to end my own life just to escape the inner agony. And in those times, at just the right time, God sent along a "Simon" of a different sort.

So, my brothers and sisters—the fields are white—millions of people are out there looking for, longing for someone to be their Simon in their lives. If, by God's grace the cross you've been given today is "lighter" than another's, if the strength you have been given allows you to help another with their cross, what is holding you back?

The entire Christian life is found in dying. Dying to self, to our flesh. A cross is a horrible, purposely prolonged way to die and it is absolutely necessary if we want to live a new resurrected, redeemed life in Him. "I am crucified with Christ, nevertheless, I live, yet not I, but Christ lives within me, and the life which I now life in the less, I live y the faith in the Son of God who loved me and gave Himself for me (Gal 2:20).

Here endeth the lesson.

RHUBARB CRUMBLE PIE

1 c. flour 1/4 tsp. salt 1 c. quick oats 1/2 c. sugar 1/3 c. melted real butter

3-4 c. diced rhubarb 1/2 c. sugar 1/4 tsp. cinnamon 1 Tbsp. butter

Combine flour, salt, oats and sugar. Stir in butter and mix until crumbly. Pat half of the crumbs onto the sides and bottom of a greased 9-inch pie plate. Save remaining half for topping.

Arrange rhubarb on crust. Sprinkle with sugar and cinnamon. Dot with 1 Tbsp. butter. Sprinkle remaining topping over filling. Bake 350° 40 minutes or until rhubarb is tender.

Survey: Most Christians Feel Encouraged And Inspired After Church Worship Services by Karen Faulkner

A new poll released recently shows that a large majority of Christians who attend church worship services are encouraged by the experience, Christian Headlines reports.

The Barna Research Group's 2021 State of the Church survey found that 82% of practicing Christians who attended church in the last six months had left a worship service feeling encouraged "most of the time." Of US adults who had

been to church in the last six months, 67% said they felt encouraged "most of the time" after a service.

Most of those who attended church also said they had left worship services feeling




"inspired." According to the poll, 78 percent of practicing Christians and 65 percent of adults who went to church said they "feel inspired 'most of the time,' or more often, after participating in a worship service."

Moreover, a similar percentage of practicing Christians (77 percent) and church-going adults (65 percent) said they felt forgiven "most of the time" after a worship service. However, 40 percent of church-going adults said they felt "guilty" about half or more than half of the time after a service.

In any event, the poll shows that "roughly seven in 10 practicing Christians (71 percent) and three in five churchgoers

(59 percent) also affirm that, 'most of the time,' they leave worship feeling as if they've learned something new," Christian Headline reports.

Zechariah and his wife Elizabeth remained steadfast in their conviction that God's promise to Israel would be fulfilled. Their situation was strikingly similar to that of Abraham and Sarah. They had a son named John of whom the Lord was to state, "among them born of women there hath not arisen a greater than John the Baptist" (Matt. 11:11).

Only Luke has given us a record of John's birth as he presented a history of the Lord "from the very first" (Luke 1:1-4). Luke's account reflects a different aspect from the other three Gospels.

Matthew depicts Him as The King of Israel, King. "Behold thy King cometh". (2ech 9:9).

Mark presents Him as a Servant. "Behold my servant". (Isa. 42:1).

Luke presents Him as the Perfect man. Behold the man whose name is the Branch". (Zech. 6:12)

John introduces Him as The lord Himself. "Behold your Godll the Messiah, the King of Israel. (Isa. 40:90).

John's birth was barely noticed by many in Israel and in all likelihood his subsequent execution was not a major topic in his day. Only time would tell how the saga of John would be so similar to that of Jesus The Messiah of whom he was the forerunner, from miraculous birth to cruel death.

John made his announcement to I'all the people of Israel" (Acts 13:24). He was at

the watershed of a critical moment in Israel's history which had extended from the law and the prophets to the announcement of The Gospel of the Kingdom. (Luke16:16). God has given a unconditional oath that there would

be an earthly kingdom and through His servant John it was announced that the time was now ripe.

However, a problem existed. Restoration $o\sim$ the nation of Israel to the earthly land of Israel depended on the willingness of the nation to repent. Israel as a nation refused to fulfill this requirement, which is so sadly and piteously described in Psalm 81, "My people would not harken unto me", The prerequisite of repentance and turning again to their God was the condition that God would fulfill His oath that a forgiven Israel would again inherit the sacred land. This condition was not fulfilled in response to John's call to repentance and will remain unfulfilled until the second advent of the Messiah in the eschatological sequence revealed in the Divine Oracles

John had been called to prepare the way for the heir of the throne and the kingdom of David. It had been predicted in the announcement to Daniel that "the God of heaven would setup a Kingdom which would never be destroyed and would last forever and would cover the whole earth." (Daniel 2:35,44). In the days of Malachi such an event was eagerly anticipated and "they that feared the Lord spoke often to one another and the Lord harkened and heard". (Malachi 3:16). For the faithful few in Israel, such as Elizabeth and Zechariah, the announcement that the King was soon to appear, an event which necessitated the overthrow of the Roman authority, and was excitement in the air. Gabriel said of John, "many shall rejoice at his birth" (Luke 1:14) but sadly the joy of many would not be seen until a much later date, when every eye shall see him and they that pierced Him. (Zech. 12:10)

The faithful few of the many held on tenaciously to this hope of the inauguration of a restored earthly Kingdom and freedom from Rome. Thus the Lord could teach his followers to pray "thy Kingdom come and thy will be done in earth as it is in heaven". (Matthew 6:10). Only in Mathew do we find the term "Kingd,om of the Heavens", but the term "Kingdom of God" is found in all of the Gospels. The Kingdom of God includes the Kingdom of Heaven, as the greater includes the lesser, for it incorporates the totality of the universe over which God is Sovereign. Matthew's use of he more restricted term "Kingdom of Heaven" indicates that John's ministry pertained to one specific division of God's universal Kingdom, namely, the people and the land of Israel. The hope of an earthy Kingdom was common knowledge and was anticipated in John's day. For many the notion of a Kingdom was nothing more than a political entity. Few, however, appreciated the fact that the Inauguration of the earthly Kingdom was conditional upon national repentance. In addition, many may have been confused by John's use of the phrase "is at hand" and that Luke's use of the term to signify "is come nigh" (Luke 10:11), where the emphasis Is clear that the King had not yet arrived but was near at hand. Solomon had emphasized that the national land of Israel would be restored and that the prerequisite was that the nation should "repent and make supplication, saying that we have sinned and so unto he Lord with all our hearts". (1 Kings 8:47). National restoration would come but only if my people who are called by my name will humble themselves.".

The lay people and the clergy, however, had different ideas about the mandated repentance. (Luke 7:29-30) Baptism in water was a public and Individual evidence that this requirement of repentance had been fulfilled, but the higher sacerdotal class rejected this outward sign and refused to participate in such an evidential practice. Their response was not simply to refuse but "rejection of", and "frustration by" the requirement, which reflected their contempt for John and his message.

The day arrived when God's predicted plan reached its apogee with the startling announcement of the arrival of the Lamb of God. (John 1:34-35). John had been used to introduce the message and soon his work was completed. He was taken away from them and eventually executed. Among the last of his messages was the announcement that He that would come would immerse them in God's Holy Spirit. (John 1:33-34).

A new day had arrived!

A Life Dedicated to Evangelism: An Interview with Luis Palau

At the age of 83 in January 2018, international bilingual Christian evangelist Luis Palau, who died March 11, 2021, was diagnosed with stage four lung cancer. That startling revelation was the impetus for him to reflect on his adventure-filled life of trusting God from his humble beginnings on the streets of Buenos Aires, Argentina, to filling stadiums and declaring the good news of Jesus Christ with tens of millions globally and personally counseling

world leaders. How as a teenager, he heard Billy Graham speak and decided to follow in his steps.

How is your book—a "spiritual memoir"—different from other types of memoirs?

Luis Palau: It isn't overly focused on me, but rather on the people that God used in my life: to bless me; to challenge me; to change me into who I am today. I want this book to encourage everybody—

whether you are a missionary or evangelist. I want it to encourage all Christians. God wants to use you in an extraordinary way!

How did your Christian faith begin?

Luis Palau: I've been asked this question often on the radio, or when we had a TV show and people would call in. People ask me often why I believe what I believe. How did I learn to believe in God? In one way, I learned from my parents. My father and mother demonstrated that God was every-

thing. And even before I "officially" became a Christian at age 12, I intellectually understood and believed that God was God.

What was the turning point in your spiritual life?

Luis Palau: Well, of course, the first major turning point was my salvation when I was 12 years old. It was two years after my father died. But another experience that really affected me in a profound way was when I was 25 years old at school at Multnomah University. I was listening to Major Ian Thomas give a talk. It changed me forever and I've never forgotten it. He reminded our class that it's not we who live, but Christ living in us (Galatians 2:19-21). Of course I knew this verse at the time. I had read it many times. But Major Thomas moved the concept of God dwelling in me away from a metaphor (as I had originally thought of it) and to reality. I realized Christ really does live in me (and you too). That's power. And when you learn to trust him, it will be revolutionary.

Colossians 2:9-10 reminds us "for in Christ all the fullness of the deity lives in bodily form, and in Christ you have been brought to fullness. He is the head over every power and authority." I understood from this talk that there was no reason to hold back being bold and committing my life to proclaiming the gospel. The Holy Spirit was in me—there was nothing to worry about in dedicating my life to evangelism.

What was the first encounter with Billy Graham and how did he influence your ministry?

Luis Palau: The first encounter was in his book titled Revival in our Time which featured some of his revival sermons from the 1950s. Billy was 29 years old and hosting massive campaigns all over the world. One campaign in the Hollywood, California area lasted nine weeks! The location that held 3,000 people was packed every night. It not only encouraged me about how God was using Billy—and could use me—at a young age, but also showed me the value of a team as I read about how the Graham team worked so tirelessly and unified. It also influenced me by reminding me that publicity is not something to apologize for.

Then later, I met him. I served as a translator at one of his crusades in Fresno (and then later internationally). Pat and I were just newly married then. Billy asked me what I wanted to do and I told him I wanted to lead campaigns like he did. For years he continued to invest me and give me new opportunities that grew me and challenged me. I am so thankful for the impact he had on my life and how he invested in me.

One aspect about Billy I will always admire is that he never missed a chance to share the gospel. I remember one prayer breakfast we attended—Billy was just scheduled to give a benediction, but used that time to share the Good News. He was bright. He was single-minded. He knew much more theology than many people but he stayed away from conflict; he kept it simple and he shared the gospel as often as he could.

Please describe your Bible reading and studying routines.

Luis Palau: I learned early on watching my dad read the Bible every morning to make it a routine. Romans 12:1 reminds us to present our bodies as a living sacrifice. I read the Bible every morning and night, and have made a habit to read a proverb every single day. I encourage you to do the same! God has a funny way of blessing the proverb you read each day to guide you in decisions that same day.

What place should the Bible hold in people's lives?

Luis Palau: The first, second, and third top place in your life. The Bible should be everything to us. Whatever you're dealing with, turn it to Scripture. It's not just a book, it's the mind of God. Every decision you make should be checked with the Bible. The Bible puts your mind, your emotions, and your decision-making process in line with God's will.

Over 7 million people across six East African countries are at the cusp of starvation as communities have faced existential threats from violence, flooding, the pandemic and locust infestation, the evangelical humanitarian organization World Vision has warned.

According to the charity, which operates in nearly 100 countries, thousands of children could face death or long-term health consequences if the international community does not respond quickly to East Africa's worsening crisis.

Debebe Dawit, program manager for World Vision's humanitarian emergency affairs team, recently visited Ethiopia and saw firsthand the effects of poverty in the East African country.

"The situation is very severe in East Africa, and particularly Ethiopia. Over 2 million people are in need of food assistance," Dawit told The Christian Post in a Thursday interview. "Among conflict, COVID-19, flooding, locust infestation, all these are adding [an] additional burden to the community."




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
