Elie Hasbani was a good soldier in old Lebanon fighting Islamic terrorist groups Hezbollah and Hamas to protect his own family, and his Christian community. He had his military training with Israel Defense Forces. Lebanon is located on the North of Israel and dates back to over 5,000 years where the Phoenicians and Canaanites, a Semitic people lived.

### Once Again, the Sacred Fire of Liberty Is Preserved



Last Tuesday, Americans spoke loudly and clearly to keep the American experiment

A few years back, I visited the National Archives here in Washington, D.C., with a Member of Congress. We had the rare privilege of seeing some of our nation's founding documents — papers not typically on public display. It wasn't a "National Treasure" adventure, but it was an unforgettable moment for

a student of history like me. One of these documents was the original U.S. Senate's markup of the Bill of Rights, sent over from the House in 1789

Another was a simple but profound page: George Washington's inaugural address, delivered on April 30, 1789. His speech was brief — only about 10 minutes — but the words were powerful. As he took his first steps as the leader of a new nation, Washington said:

"Since we ought to be no less persuaded that the propitious smiles of Heaven, can never be expected on a nation that disregards the eternal rules of order and right, which Heaven itself has ordained: And since the preservation of the sacred fire of liberty, and the destiny of the Republican model of Government, are justly considered as deeply, perhaps as finally staked, on the experiment entrusted to the hands of the American people."

From the very beginning, our republican form of government — placing the power to govern into the hands of the people — was viewed as an "experiment." Why? Because nothing like it had ever been tried before. Self-government, grounded in the rule of law and crafted for a nation this vast and diverse, was unprecedented. The Constitution was new, untested, and the Founders knew that true power now rested with the people, not a monarchy or ruling elite. They also understood that this experiment depended not only on good laws but on a bedrock of virtue and morality, rooted in timeless truth.

John Adams captured this reality in 1798. "Our constitution was made only for a moral and religious people," he insisted. "It is whol-

ly inadequate to the government of any other."

Washington had previously stated this point in his Farewell Address in 1796. This grand experiment of ours, he reminded us, could not survive if truth and morality were ignored or discarded.

And thank God, there are still Americans who understand that reality today — who saw that what Kamala Harris offered was an agenda that would have aborted this experiment and snuffed out our hardwon freedoms.

But we can't be lulled into complacency. The American experiment isn't on autopilot; it is not "safe and secure." Our work is far from over. Right now, we have an opportunity, a window, to fortify the moral foundation

of this experiment — to restore, promote, and protect what Washington called the two great pillars of our political prosperity: religion and morality.

If America is to thrive, if we are to pass this precious experiment down to future generations, we must remember this: political and economic greatness cannot survive without moral goodness.

As the scriptures declare: Blessed is the nation whose God is the Lord.

and I felt peaceful and joy both in my body and in my soul. A strange power filled my body, and I started to laugh and praise God out loud. What was happening to me? I had changed in an instant! Elie kept his promise before the Lord."

We descended the mountain with my troops trying to hold my leg in place while carrying me. The severe pain was growing by the minute. Every step down was treacherous; one wrong step could cost us our lives...I could have easily died from all the bleeding but I didn't and despite all the pain, a strange peace filled my soul and I remained very calm. An ambulance was awaiting. Hasbani had an operation and the left leg had to be cut off below the knee. His face was burned from the explosion plus dirt and blood covered his face. His family was with him at the time. He was given painkillers but sorrow about his lost left leg lead to deep moods. Elie was in the hospital for over two months. During the whole incident, the Holy Spirit was his Comforter.

In June 1986; after Elie had drenched his pillow with tears, Jesus appeared to him in a dream at night, and lit up his room with a bright light. He saw himself in heaven, his leg growing until it became perfect. It was an incredible dream that filled him with an indescribable joy. He was flying in heaven and stepping on the long grass that had life. Every time he stepped on it, it didn't break or die; instead it grew back instantly and took its former shape. He woke up with a

strange feeling that his leg was still there. He opened his Bible and a verse lit up before eyes, which said: "follow me". He closed the Bible and opened it again. More verses appeared to him confirming his call to follow Christ, as Matthew 5:30 asserted, "It is better for you to lose one part of your body than for your whole body to go to hell."

Elie knew that it was Jesus calling him into ministry. He renewed the decision he had made when he was lying on the ground dying from the land mine explosion: Psalm 117:17-18: "I shall not die, but live and declare the works of the Lord. The Lord chastened me severely but he has not given me over to death."

He went on to follow the Lord and proclaim the work of God. He became a servant and missionary to the Nations, especially to Muslim culture. In the past he was a pastor, church planter, and evangelist in Beirut, Lebanon and the Middle East for ten years. Dr. Elie Hasbani realized that, although Islam is an anti-Christ ideology, Muslims are people living in darkness and under the influence of Satan. God revealed, through the Cross, his love for the Muslim people and His desire that they be saved. Dr. Hasbani saw this coming to pass once he started his ministry in the Middle East and moved to Milwaukee.

In 2007, he founded "Running For Hope, Inc", a non-profit organization dedicated to providing aid to victims of conflict in

developing countries and He is the author of two books: The Good Soldier, which is in English, French, and Arabic. His second book Cross Over To The Cross: Bringing the Hope of the Cross to Shia Muslims in Your Community. Elie's source of strength is The Word of God. As a former soldier, Pastor Elie knows personally of the hatred that Hamas and Hezbollah have for Israel, but the power of love and forgiveness of the Lord can over power hatred.

Today and through all the years, God has been faithful to Elie as He promised. He has never forsaken or left him, and guides Elie in all situations and circumstances.

### Alistair Begg Warns Rise Of 'Consumer' Worship Eroding Biblical Engagement in Congregational Life

In a message delivered at the annual Sing! Conference in Nashville, Tennessee, Begg, the senior pastor of Cleveland's Parkside Church, said that in churches around the world, the pulpit once stood as a monumental symbol of spiritual authority. Yet, over time, this symbol has all but faded, making way for a more casual and consumer-friendly approach to worship spaces.

That change, the 72-year-old Scottish pastor said, represents more than just a design preference — it reflects a deeper shift in how churches engage with the Bible itself.

"Traditionally, the pulpit was central and visually dominant, not as an expression of the preacher's authority, but as a reminder of the authority of Scripture," Begg said, recalling the awe he felt as a child when the church "beadle" carried the Bible to the pulpit before the service began.

But today, in many churches, that centrality has been lost, he said.

"Plexiglass, bar stools — why? Well, you've got to please the consumers," Begg said, referring to the modern trend of trying to make worship spaces feel less formal and more accessible. "It's a noble prospect, but there's an unfortunate symbolism to it."

For Begg, the decline of the raised pulpit is emblematic of a broader issue: the diminishing role of Scripture in congregational life. He contended that modern churchgoers often arrive not with an expectation to encounter God's Word, but with a more casual mindset.

"Instead of coming into worship with the express understanding that all of this begins with God in His glory, people come with coffee in hand, saying, 'Let's see if he's got something good for us today," he said


"Expositional preaching gives way to inspirational talks, which gives way to therapeutical endeavors," he continued. "Tm not sure that America understands just how deep the problem is, in relationship to biblical illiteracy. You cannot continue to make your journey through life without your Bible, not as a talisman, not as something just to be revered in a corner, but without the Bible as our daily source of knowledge and encounter with God."

Begg called for a return to what he calls "serious engagement with the Bible," where the focus is less on inspirational talks and more on expositional preaching — preaching that seeks to unfold the meaning of the text, not just offer uplifting or therapeutic messages.

"There is a correlation between a collapse in our understanding of God and the expressions that are represented in the pulpit," he emphasized. "You see, the task of the pastor in coming to the scriptures is not simply to provide information about what the Bible says with a few pointers to take home, fill in the blanks kind of stuff. That's not the primary objective in the unfolding of Scripture. The desire, the longing of the pastor and the preacher and the people is that we might have a divine encounter with the living God through His Word, that we might meet God, that we might hear from God. ... We don't need to hear what Alistair knows about this or that. We need to hear from God."

"Congregational worship is not just a get-together. It begins with God, not with myself in my need," he told the audience, adding that when the focus shifts from God's Word to personal experience or entertainment, something vital is lost.

"Why it is so hard, in many cases, to get people to sing? The poor people up here, they've got to be here one hour early in order to get themselves all jazzed up, so in the hope that they can get us all jazzed up. And if we don't get jazzed up immediately, then we're



going to sing it again, and we'll keep singing it until you're jazzed up. And we'll repeat the chorus 14 times, and we'll make sure that you're finally there. What's the problem? Spiritual deadness is the problem." he lamented.

Begg referenced the Reformer Martin Luther, who, in The Bondage of the Will, declared that without the Spirit of God, no one can truly understand Scripture.

"Even if we can quote it, discuss it, or memorize it, we don't know it apart from the work of the Spirit," Begg said, echoing Luther's sentiment. This, he explained, is why so much of modern worship feels

hollow — because it is disconnected from the Spirit-driven engagement with the Bible.

Begg also stressed the importance of worshiping "in spirit and in truth," explaining that true worship requires the work of the Holy Spirit. "Dead men and women don't sing," Begg said, pointing to the necessity of spiritual life to engage in genuine worship.

The pastor added that the real leader of Christian worship is not the preacher, the musician or the choir director — it is Christ Himself.

"Jesus is the worship leader," Begg said, citing the book of Hebrews. "He is the one who makes worship possible, and He is the one who leads us in praise."

"Don't sacrifice the exposition of Scripture for the exuberance of praise," he concluded.

The annual Sing! conference, organized by Christian musicians Keith and Kristyn Getty, focuses on deepening theological understanding in church worship.

The theme of this year's conference, held Sept. 4-6, was "The Songs of the Bible" and featured keynote speakers, worship leaders, theologians and artists from around the world.

In a previous interview with The Christian Post, Keith Getty said he and his wife launched the conference because of their belief in the pivotal role of music in biblical teachings and the need for Christians to stay rooted in their faith amid societal changes.

"The New Testament says we're letting the Word of Christ dwell in us richly when we meet together singing psalms, hymns and spiritual songs," the Grammy-nominated songwriter said.

"We live in such a transformative generation informationally, in terms of everything from artificial intelligence to gender to globalization to financial inequality. All of these things are going to reach whole new levels in the next generation."

Getty noted that many commentators predict that by 2050, nominal Christianity might disappear due to the increasing challenges posed by Western culture.

"You're either going to be a very serious Christian grappling with these things, or you'll not survive," the Irish songwriter said.

"So much of modern Christian behavior is, 'I don't want to be on the wrong side of history,' or 'I'm worried this is going to not go down too well.' I think we've got to stop being such cowards. If we believe in Christ, His death and resurrection, the Gospel story and the authority of the Word of God, then we want that to be coming into every part of our minds, our emotions, in our families and in our homes. Fill our homes with songs of the Lord. Start where you are, fill your own mind with songs of the Lord and fill your family's minds with songs of the Lord. If you have a role in your church, help your church sing songs of the Lord."




### The Heart of God vs The Heart of Man



### GEORGE SWEETING, EVANGELIST WHO LED MOODY BIBLE INSTITUTE FOR DECADES, DIES AT 99 By Anugrah Kumar



Moody Bible Institute has announced that George Sweeting, who served the institution for nearly 30 years between his time as president and later as chancellor, died Tuesday at the age of 99. He was "at heart an evangelist and soul winner," the institute said.

"An indelible mark has been placed on this world as well as Moody through the incredible life and ministry of George Sweeting," said Moody Bible Institute President Mark Jobe in a statement shared with The Christian Post.

"His legacy is marked by a deep love for his family, the Church, and the transformative power of the Gospel," Jobe added. "While we mourn with his family and those whose lives were touched by him, we echo the Apostle Paul's words in 1 Thessalonians 4 that we do so with hope, knowing he is in the presence of the Lord and we will be reunited with him one day."

Sweeting's tenure at the Chicago-based Moody Bible Institute spanned several decades, beginning in 1971 as president and concluding as chancellor at the end of 1999. A Moody alumnus from the class of 1945, Sweeting's leadership and legacy have helped shape the institution's direction and impact, according to an obituary.

Sweeting is survived by his wife, Hilda, and their sons George, James, Donald and Robert, as well as multiple grandchildren and great-grandchildren.

Sweeting's journey began in a robust Christian family environment, which he credited as foundational to his spiritual development. His leadership qualities emerged early and were shaped significantly during his teenage years at the Hawthorne Gospel Church in New Jersey. The church's youth ministry, known for its dynamic outreach, was a crucible that honed his Evangelical zeal.

Sweeting's narrative took a dramatic turn in 1940 when he fully committed to Christian service. His ministry began in earnest at Hawthorne Gospel, where he was ordained and later served as an associate pastor.

His academic and pastoral journey was marked by a brief but intense battle with testicular cancer during his senior year at Moody.

After school, Sweeting's evangelistic call led him across America and beyond as an itinerant preacher for nine years, conducting revival meetings and Evangelical campaigns. With colleagues, Sweeting preached almost daily and traveled nationwide in a large semi-truck carrying the tent for the evangelistic outreaches.

His return to pastoral ministry saw him revitalizing dying churches, notably the Madison Avenue Baptist Church in New Jersey and later The Moody Church in Chicago.

His dynamic leadership at The Moody Church eventually transitioned to a larger role within the Moody Bible Institute.

Under Sweeting's presidency, the institute saw significant expansion and innovation, launching new programs and extending its educational and Evangelical reach globally, including through the Moody Pastor's Conference and the expansion of Moody Radio.

Sweeting's latter years were marked by a return to local church ministry, focusing on senior adult ministry until his retirement in 2018.

His final years culminated in the publication of his last book, Full Circle: A Pictorial Autobiography of George and Hilda Sweeting.

In one of his last public addresses at Moody Bible Institute's President's Chapel in 2012, the then-88-year-old Sweeting reflected on D.L. Moody's legacy. He shared Henry Varley's influential words — that the world had yet to see what God can do with a person fully devoted to Jesus Christ — and challenged the students, asking, "Will you be that man? Will you be that woman? I pray so. Hallelujah, amen and amen."

### KATE FORBES TELLS SCOTLAND'S CHRISTIANS NOT TO 'FEAR,' CHURCH IS PIVOTAL TO FIXING NATION'S PROBLEMS By Christian Today

Scotland's deputy first minister has sought to reassure Christians that they have a role to play in helping the country address its challenges.

Speaking at an event at the Scottish Parliament hosted by the Evangelical Alliance, Kate Forbes encouraged Christians to be confident in seeking to serve the nation and their communities in love.

"We know the big changes that have been delivered over generations in this country because of the work of Christians in the country," said Forbes, who is a committed Christian.

"And we have a choice right now as to whether that will continue to be the case. And I want to be part of it, and I hope you do too."

The event was held on Wednesday to mark the publication of the Evangelical Alliance's new report, What Kind of Nation?, which sets out a number of priority areas for Christian engagement, including the economy, education, drug addiction, depopulation and poverty reduction.

Commending the report, Forbes said: "I often talk to people and there's an element of fear, there's an element of worry, there are



questions of whether we should get involved or not, and my response is to have that confidence to get involved.

"Because we know that the need is great, and as a Church, as faith communities, there is an opportunity for us to do something that demonstrates that love."

What Kind of Nation? was been published 10 years after the referendum on Scottish independence in 2014. It says more attention needs to be paid to the challenges of depopulation, and calls on the Scottish government to make improvements to how faith is taught in schools. The report also features examples of the work that Evangelical Alliance member organizations are already doing in these areas.

Addressing Wednesday's report launch at Holyrood, Conservative MSP Jeremy Balfour said: "Many of us have experience of

what the churches, what the faith communities are doing, the impact that they have on vulnerable people across our society, but also other sectors as well.

"I often say to people, it would be interesting if we all went on strike for 48 hours. What would Scotland look like?

"I think that's a real challenge for us, as politicians, to take the work that is done seriously and to recognize the importance of it and the need to be able to fund it and to support it in different ways."

Lynne Paterson, head of the Evangelical Alliance in Scotland, asked policymakers to pay attention to the work the Church is doing.

"We want to encourage policymakers that the Church has got something really important to contribute and to encourage churches to be that good news within their communities," she said.

"The member organizations that are featured in the report represent just a fraction of the value that Christians are contributing to Scotland, and they're all involved in this liberating good news mission.

"They're motivated by God's love and God's mercy; they've experienced it themselves, and they want to give it out. And they're compelled by the kind of vision that Jesus came to proclaim, that we read about in the Bible, the vision that He (God) had for a different kind of society."







### **Veterans Like Me Face Struggles After Service. What Saved Me** By Brandon Olson

I took many different paths in my life that eventually became my book. Remaining steadfast on the straight and narrow became difficult. With my senses dulled and intuition inundated with static, my active thinking deferred. I often wondered in my adolescent years, "Who am I, where do I go?"

At 18, I did not believe my life would ever involve a college degree. With two failed tours at community college and an embarrassing discharge from the baseball team, I did not fare well as a young adult. My circumstances dehydrated my purpose, and I needed to invigorate my spirit with life. I needed to test myself as a man and see if I could stand on my own two feet. That's when I came to the conclusion that God called me to join the

I did not foresee myself becoming an infantry paratrooper. Honestly, I lived a pretty sheltered life. I was the kid playing sports, video games and eating cheeseburgers. But still, I found myself in the Army and I literally jumped in. Although mild and quiet, I worked hard and excelled physically. I jumped out of airplanes, shot heavy weapons, directed my battalion through military communication — but also confronted my bullies, spoke truth in the face of adversity, and generally failed a lot.

The military attempts to prepare transitioning soldiers for the civilian world through TAP (Transition Assistance Program), yet most military transitioned civilians struggle to cement themselves as a member of the ci-

vilian community. Needless to say, veterans face tough transitions — no roadmap exists.

VA.org states that 35,574 veterans remain homeless in the United States. That is truly a

travesty. I knew many veterans addicted to alcohol, pills, and sadness. I was one of them. Funny, I did not know I walked knee deep in self-destruction until I shook on the floor with hallucinations after an intense weekend bender.

I moved from three meals a day, a detailed work schedule, and a uniform to a scruffy looking hippy within three months. I did not have any structure and could indulge in some vices not allowed in the military. I also felt on top of the world.

But as they say, with great pride comes a great fall. Yet I remained resilient, picking myself back up with the help of prayer and reflection. My faith bloomed and I began to think of my life as an adventure once again — working odd jobs, cooking, cleaning houses and doing manual labor. Anything to keep busy and rebuild upon my foundation of hard work and grit.

I moved out of my parent's home and finished community college. With newfound vigor in my academic career, I set my sights on Pepperdine and found a home through the university's message — "servant leadership." I finally found belonging at Pepperdine.

I found Christ when I was a child. I randomly read the Gospels. I did not understand the magnitude of reading the Gospels, but

God works in mysterious ways. I fell off for a bit but rekindled my curiosity when I encountered Jordan Peterson's biblical series. I searched for God and had a prodigal son moment. This reminded me that God wants a personal relationship with me and will never leave

### A New Identity: The Decorated Middle-Distance Runner on Her Faith Journey In Her Own Words By Chanelle Price

As I stood on the starting line for the 800m final at the 2021Olympic Trials, I felt so much joy, peace and gratitude. Such a stark contrast to the overwhelming emotions of fear, anxiety, worry and doubt I experienced at the 2008, 2012, and 2016 Trials.

### **MY FALSE IDENTITY**

In 2008, I was a senior in high school garnering a ton of attention for my success on the track. This was exhilarating for 17-year-old me whose entire identity had become "Chanelle Price, The Track Star." The pressure to uphold this title, though, became too much to bear throughout my college years at the University of Tennessee (2008-2012).

I felt like I was running with the weight of the world on my shoulders, and it wasn't fun anymore. It wasn't until I hit rock bottom in my first post-collegiate season (2013) that things changed, and that change was God.

I laid in my hotel room in complete darkness (literally and figuratively) at the 2013 USA Track and Field Championships. After failing to make it to the final round, I was contemplating if life was worth living anymore. Who was I if I wasn't "Chanelle Price, The Track Star?"

That's when I heard God speak to me. It wasn't like the windows of heaven opened up and He shouted in a loud, scary voice. It was more like a gentle whisper, words I knew weren't from me because I would never say anything of this nature: "Chanelle, if you just chase after Me like you chase after track, just watch what I do in your life."

Huh?! Chase after You, God?! What does that even mean?!

I knew of God, and I accepted Jesus Christ as my Lord and Savior in high school, but I didn't have a personal relationship with Him. In that moment, though, I was willing to try ANYTHING.

### A NEW WAY TO RUN

At every USA Track and Field Outdoor Championship, there are chapels held for athletes, coaches and support staff. I reached out to one of the individuals leading the chapels in 2013, Jodi Hasbrouck, and basically told her that I needed help. Shortly after, we began a weekly Bible study with two other USA track and field women.

I was committed to forming a relationship with God through studying His Word, going to church and surrounding myself with a community of believers. Embarking on this new faith walk was life-changing. I was introduced to God's immense love, and it was explained to me that God loved me despite my performance on the track.

All He wants is for me to use my gift of running as a form of worship to Him. This was so freeing! Running became fun again. The heaviness was lifted off of my shoulders, and in 2014 I went on to win the Indoor World Championships, becoming the first and only American woman to win gold in a world championship 800m.

### **BROKEN DREAMS**

A few months after winning that title, though, I broke a bone in my foot.

"Was God mad at me?" I asked myself. "What's the point of faithfully following God if bad things are still going to happen to me?" This began a two-and-a-half-year streak of me chasing after God but also chasing after the things of this world.

By the end of 2016, I felt so empty inside. Nothing satisfied me. Not running. Not money. Not success. Not fame. Not guys. Not family. Not friends. Not social media.

I knew the problem was that I had drifted away from God, and I can remember praying something like this: "Lord, I know nothing else in this world can satisfy me other than my relationship with Jesus. Here I am. Do whatever it is You need to do to deepen my relationship with You."



What came after that prayer

was four of the hardest years of my life. In January 2017, I was diagnosed with pulmonary embolism (blood clots in my lungs) followed by mononucleosis in June 2017 and a fractured foot in October 2017. In January 2018, I lost my Nike contract.

In February 2018, I fractured my foot for the second time and had surgery. And in April 2018, I lost my nephew at birth to preeclampsia. I spent the second half of 2018 and all of 2019 trying to make a return from foot surgery, and in 2020 we were all hit with a pandemic.

Then, in November 2020, I fractured my foot FOR THE THIRD TIME.

During those times, I felt despair, confusion, fear, worry, doubt, anger and discouragement. Faith doesn't stop those emotions from coming, but faith does allow you to overcome them. Through prayer, worship and God's Word, I was able to get out of that pit of darkness.

On the days when I didn't feel like getting out of bed, the days when I didn't have it in me to keep fighting, the days when I just wanted to give up, I would cry out to God and tell Him exactly how I felt. I would blast my worship music in order to take my focus from my circumstances to my Almighty God.

I would recite Scripture over and over and over again until I believed it. Some of my key verses were Proverbs 3:5,6, Philippians 4:6,7, Isaiah 40:31, Isaiah 41:10, James 1:2-4, Romans 5:3-5 and Romans 9:30

Romans 8:28 (New Living Translation) says: "And we know that God causes everything to work together for the good of those who love God and are called according to His purpose for them."

Was everything I went through good? Absolutely not. But good has certainly come from it. My relationship with God has gone to such a deeper level, which is exactly what I prayed for back in 2016.

There's something about hardships that make you so desperately dependent on God, and as you cling to Him, He's able to reveal things about Himself you've never seen before.

As you abide in Him (John 15:4) and seek Him first (Matthew 6:33) and love Him with all of your heart, soul, mind and strength (Mark 12:30), the Holy Spirit is able to do a work in you and produce the fruit of the Spirit (Galatians 5:22,23) in your life.

### **MY NEW IDENTITY**

In the 2020 Olympic Trials 800m final, I left my all out there on the track. I stood on the line just so grateful for everything God had brought me through. If it wasn't for my faith in Him, I would've no doubt given up.

Although I ran a personal best time, I did not qualify for the Olympics. My dream of becoming an Olympian has come to an end. But perhaps, in God's eyes, it was never about the end goal. Perhaps it's always been about the journey and the transformation from a girl who once defined herself as "Chanelle Price, The Track Star" to a woman who now identifies as "Chanelle Price, The Child Of God."

### **CRANBERRY WALNUT PIE**

- 1 c. flour
- 1 c. sugar
- 1/4 tsp. salt
- 2 eggs
- 6 Tbsp. butter, melted and cooled slightly
- 1 tsp. almond extract
- 2 c. cranberries, halved (fresh or frozen)
- 1/2 c. chopped walnuts

Preheat oven to 350°. Grease a 9-inch pie pan. Combine flour, sugar and salt. Set aside. In another bowl, whisk together eggs, butter and almond extract. Stir in cranberries and walnuts. Add to dry ingredients, and stir only until mixed. Mixture will be very thick. Spread batter into pie pan. Bake at 350° about 40 minutes or until a toothpick inserted near center comes out clean. If needed, cover outside of pan with foil to prevent excess browning. Serve warm with whipped cream or ice cream if desired.

### AI: A POWERFUL TOOL, BUT DO NOT LET IT BECOME ANOTHER IDOL – A CHRISTIAN PERSPECTIVE ON TECHNOLOGY

As Christians, we are called to discern the times and navigate the complexities of modern life with wisdom. Today, one of the most pressing issues is the rise of Artificial Intelligence (AI) and how we should view and use this power-



ful technology. Some express concerns about AI, fearing it may lead us down a path of spiritual and moral confusion. However, rather than rejecting AI outright, we must find a balance, understanding its potential as a tool while avoiding the trap of attributing human-like qualities to it.

### HISTORICAL CONTEXT: LEARNING FROM THE PAST

We do not want to be like the Luddites of old, who, in fear of the unknown, rejected technological progress by destroying machines during the Industrial Revolution. Their fear stemmed from a belief that new machinery would displace their livelihoods and bring ruin. Instead, as Christians, we should approach AI with wisdom and discernment—recognizing its benefits while guarding against potential misuse.

### AI AS A TOOL: CONCRETE EXAMPLES

AI is a remarkable tool that has the potential to transform various aspects of our lives:

- Healthcare: AI can analyze medical images to detect diseases earlier and more accurately than human doctors alone.
- Education: Adaptive learning systems can personalize education, helping students learn at their own pace.
- Environmental Conservation: AI models can predict climate patterns and help in developing sustainable solutions.
- Accessibility: AI-powered voice assistants and text-to-speech technologies can greatly improve life for people with disabilities.

While these applications show great promise, we must remember that AI is just that: a tool. It is created by humans, designed to serve human purposes. It lacks the body, soul, and spirit that God breathed into mankind.

### THE UNIQUE NATURE OF HUMAN BEINGS

As the Apostle Paul reminded the early church, "For we are His work-manship, created in Christ Jesus for good works" (Ephesians 2:10). God created us in His image, giving us the capacity for reason, creativity, and moral responsibility. AI, on the other hand, operates based on algorithms, programming, and data—it does not have free will or the capacity for true understanding, love, or spiritual connection.

### THE DANGER OF IDOLATRY IN A TECHNOLOGICAL AGE

Scripture warns us against the dangers of idolatry. In ancient times, idols were crafted from wood or stone. Today, the danger of idolatry is more subtle but no less real. We live in a world that increasingly values technology and innovation, sometimes to the point of worshiping human achievement. AI can easily become an idol, an "image" created in the likeness of fallen, sinful man.

### **ETHICAL CONSIDERATIONS**

As we embrace AI technology, we must be mindful of several ethical challenges:

- Privacy: AI systems often require vast amounts of personal data.
   How do we balance technological advancement with the right to privacy?
- 2. Job Displacement: As AI automates more tasks, how do we ensure that people are not left behind economically?

- 3. Bias: AI systems can perpetuate and amplify human biases. How do we ensure fairness and equality?
- 4. Autonomy: As AI becomes more advanced, how do we maintain human agency in decision-making?

As Christians, we should approach these issues guided by principles of human dignity, justice, and love for our neighbors.

### **BALANCING BENEFITS AND SPIRITUAL RISKS**

As Christians embrace the benefits of AI, we must also be aware of potential spiritual risks, including the possibility of demonic deception. Here's how we can maintain this delicate balance:

- 1. Grounding in Faith: Regular Bible reading, prayer, and fellow-ship provide spiritual grounding. This helps Christians discern Al's outputs against biblical truths and maintain focus on their faith. As Proverbs 3:5-6 reminds us, "Trust in the Lord with all your heart and lean not on your own understanding; in all your ways submit to him, and he will make your paths straight."
- 2. Ethical Use of AI: We should recognize AI as a tool that can enhance productivity and potentially aid in spreading the gospel. However, we must remain vigilant about its potential misuse for deception and manipulation. As Jesus warned in Matthew 24:24, "For false messiahs and false prophets will appear and perform great signs and wonders to deceive, if possible, even the elect."
- 3. Community and Accountability: Engage in discussions within faith communities to navigate AI's complexities. This ensures its use aligns with Christian values and promotes genuine human connections. The author of Hebrews advises in Hebrews 10:24-25, "And let us consider how we may spur one another on toward love and good deeds, not giving up meeting together, as some are in the habit of doing, but encouraging one another."
- 4. Spirit-Guided Wisdom: Approach AI with caution, using it to complement rather than replace spiritual practices. Remain alert to its ability to propagate misinformation. James 1:5 offers guidance: "If any of you lacks wisdom, you should ask God, who gives generously to all without finding fault, and it will be given to you."
- 5. Discernment in Information: As AI becomes more sophisticated in generating human-like responses, including on spiritual matters, it's crucial to test everything against Scripture. 1 John 4:1 advises, "Dear friends, do not believe every spirit, but test the spirits to see whether they are from God, because many false prophets have gone out into the world."

### PRACTICAL APPLICATION: AN ELDER'S THREE PRINCIPLES

Now that I am considered an Elder by my age of 68, I can share with you my three principles for experiencing God's grace while navigating the complexities of modern technology, including AI:

- Solitary Study of God's Word: Spend time alone with God, studying His Word as your primary source of wisdom and instruction.
   This practice helps build discernment and a strong biblical foundation, crucial for navigating the complexities of AI and modern technology.
- Prayer in Solitude and Community: Engage in both personal prayer time and prayer with others in real-life settings. This balanced approach to prayer nurtures your individual relationship with God while fostering spiritual connections within your community.
- Real Fellowship with Believers: Participate in physical, interactive meetings with other believers, such as Bible studies or group discussions. This face-to-face interaction is irreplaceable and serves as a counterbalance to the virtual nature of AI and online communications.



These principles emphasize the irreplaceable nature of genuine spiritual practices and human connections. While we can use AI as a tool, it should never substitute for these essential aspects of our faith iourney.

### **STRIKING THE BALANCE**

As an elder who has witnessed significant technological changes, I can attest that we shouldn't reject technology outright like the Luddites of old. We all use various forms of technology in our daily lives, from cell phones to computers. The question is how to approach AI

The key is to use AI as a tool while being acutely aware of its potential for deception. Here are some practical tips:

- 1. Set Boundaries: Establish clear limits on your AI usage, ensuring it doesn't encroach on your time for prayer, Bible study, and fellowship.
- 2. Verify Information: Always cross-reference AI-generated information with trusted spiritual sources, primarily the Bible and respected Christian literature.
- 3. Maintain Real-World Connections: Prioritize face-to-face interactions and real-world spiritual practices over virtual or AI-assisted alternatives.
- 4. Use AI to Enhance, Not Replace: Leverage AI for tasks like scheduling prayer times or finding relevant Bible verses, but never as a substitute for personal spiritual disciplines.
- 5. Stay Accountable: Share your AI usage habits with trusted fellow believers, allowing them to provide feedback and keep you accountable.

### **CONCLUSION**

AI holds tremendous potential, but we must remember that it is not a replacement for humanity, nor should it become an idol. We are called to engage with it wisely, using AI as a tool to serve God's purposes and improve human life, while avoiding the spiritual dangers of idolatry and over-reliance.

Ultimately, AI, like all human inventions, is a reflection of our ability to innovate and create. But we must always remember that we are God's creation, uniquely designed with a soul and spirit that no machine can replicate. AI is powerful, but it is not human, and it certainly is not divine. 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### 'God Is in Control' Is A 'Cop-Out': Pastor Rafael Cruz Urges Christians To **Get Politically Involved**

Pastor Rafael Cruz, the father of U.S. Sen. Ted Cruz of Texas, urged Christians to be more politically involved, declaring that the popular phrase "God is in control" is a "cop-out."

During a speech last Friday at the Christians Engaged Conference at Sojourn Church in Carrollton, Texas, Cruz argued that "the Church has failed America" by not being more outspoken.

"Unfortunately, we have

many pastors that are a bunch of wimps," said Cruz. "The pastor has a responsibility to lead the sheep in every area of life. Most pastors are not doing that."

"Most pastors are afraid to say anything controversial. To say anything that may offend somebody. Because if they offend somebody and they leave, their money leaves with them. Jesus called them 'hirelings.' They are no longer pastors.'



Cruz went on to explain how he has often heard the phrase "God is in control," and how he believes that such a statement is counterproductive to a politically engaged faith life.

"I want to tell you, 'God is in control' is a copout," he said. "God is in control' is an excuse that Christians give to justify sitting on their rear ends doing nothing, while the country is going to Hell in a handbasket."

Cruz argued that the phrase "is not even biblical," calling it "the equivalent of hyper-Calvinism," believing that the phrase implies that "we are puppets and God is pulling the strings."

"It denies individual responsibility; it denies free will," Cruz continued. "If there is a fundamental principle of Scripture, it is the principle of stewardship. We are stewards of all of God's creation.'

Cruz cited Genesis 1:26-28, in which God gives mankind "dominion over the fish of the sea, and over the fowl of the air, and over every living thing that moveth upon the earth."

"We have a stewardship responsibility over this country of ours," said Cruz. "We have a stewardship responsibility over America."

The pastor talked about various other issues, including concerns over trans ideology entering public schools, claiming that the United States government was based on the Bible, and stressed the importance of Christians running for local school boards.

Cruz briefly talked about his background in Cuba, where he languished under the authoritarian Communist government, noting that "when I lost my freedom in Cuba, I had a place to come to."

"If we lose our freedoms here, where are we going to go?" he asked.

Cruz's remarks were part of the annual conference held by the group Christians Engaged, which seeks to politically mobilize churches to support socially conservative causes.





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

### False Idols and a True God

Sometimes the smallest and most overlooked sections of Scripture contain important truths. Such is the case with Acts 12:20–25. The entire chapter of Acts 12 focuses on a classic New Testament villain, Herod Agrippa I. What we read about him, we don't like. He kills one of the Apostles (James) and arrests another (Peter), presumably intent on killing him as well. As we're reading through the book of Acts, in chapter 12, we learn all this stuff about this evil leader, and by the time we come to the end of the chapter, it's easy to just breeze through the final verses. Herod got what was coming to him, and then he was eaten by worms...gross! Well, what's next? Chapter 13, Barnabas and Saul, Great! Let's see what they're up to!

But by skipping Acts 12:20–25, we miss out on some incredible and timeless truths.

20 Now Herod had been very angry with the people of Tyre and Sidon; but they came to him with one accord, and having made Blastus the king's personal aide their friend, they asked for peace, because their country was supplied with food by the king's country.

21 So on a set day Herod, arrayed in royal apparel, sat on his throne and gave an oration to them. 22 And the people kept shouting, "The voice of a god and not of a man!" 23 Then immediately an angel of the Lord struck him, because he did not give glory to God. And he was eaten by worms and died.

24 But the word of God grew and multiplied.

25 And Barnabas and Saul returned from Jerusalem when they had fulfilled their ministry, and they also took with them John whose surname was Mark. -Acts 12:20–25 NKJV

### THE FATALITY OF IDOLS (VV. 20-23)

The "Herods" were a family of Roman-appointed rulers over Israel during this time. The Herod of Acts 12 is Herod Agrippa I. He is the grandson of Herod the Great, the ruler of Israel at the time of Jesus' birth. He is the nephew of Herod Antipas, the ruler of Galilee at the time of Jesus' death. Agrippa was angry with the people of Tyre and Sidon. We aren't told why, but we shouldn't be surprised. It seems like many in this family line had the same evil tendencies; none of them were all that nice of people.

Tyre and Sidon were two coastal cities on the Mediterranean Sea in the province of Phoenicia, just north of Israel. They were prominent cities in Bible history. Being coastal cities, they were important centers of commerce, and they played a role in many Old Testament events, such as their people helping to build the first Temple. Much is written about them in Scripture, including a few prophecies of their destruction.

They were outside the jurisdiction of Herod Agrippa, but for whatever reason he seemed to be quarreling with his neighbors to the north. This presented a problem for the people in these two cities because they were dependent on Herod for food.

We know from the previous chapter of Acts, that there was a great famine in the land (Acts 11:27–28). This famine left the people of Tyre and Sidon unable to provide food for themselves and thus dependent on Herod. A detailed student of Bible history will know that people in these cities have been receiving food from Israel for centuries, since the time of King Solomon, who gave wheat and oil to the king of Tyre year by year. (1 Kings 5:11). Centuries later, they were given food and oil in exchange for the cedar trees they provided to help the Jewish exiles rebuild Jerusalem (Ezra 3:7).

Perhaps some people in these cities had come to expect food from Israel. Whatever the case, they needed food now, but they needed to get in better favor with Herod to get it. Luckily for them, they were able to persuade the king's aide, Blastus, to act as an intermediary and broker a peace deal. We can deduce that Herod accepted their



terms. First, though, he wanted to have them over for a celebration of sorts and deliver a speech.

We don't know much of the details of whatever this celebration and speech was about from what Scripture tells us. More details can be found in extrabiblical sources, such as the works of Josephus. According to Josephus, this was a feast held in honor of the Roman Emperor Claudius. Josephus writes that "[Herod] put on a garment made wholly of silver and of a contexture truly wonderful, and came into the theater early in the morning; at which time the silver of his garment being illuminated by the fresh reflection of the sun's rays upon it, shone out."

Picture a scene with great pomp and pageantry. Herod was laying it on thick for the people, with his sparkly silver robe, and the people responded. They began to shout, "the voice of a god, and not of a man." Herod did not rebuke them. He seemed quite willing to usurp God. Luke describes this from a theological point of view: "he did not give God the glory." For that, he paid the price. An angel of the Lord struck him down as punishment for blasphemy. We are told simply "he was eaten by worms and breathed his last," a common ancient expression.

Some scholars say that Herod lingered for days after this incident in terrible abdominal pain. Some have suggested this was a ruptured appendix, others a severe case of tapeworms. Whatever the medical diagnosis, I can sum up the spiritual diagnosis in one word – Idolatry!

The people set up Herod as their idol. They were offering up their worship to him to appease him and looking to him for provision. Instead, they should've been worshipping the true God and seeking him first for their needs.

For us in 21st-century America, we probably think of idols as some object. We think of Old Testament-type idols – the golden calf or a carved statue– stuff that doesn't apply to us. But idols exist in all forms and fashions even today. Pastor and Biblical Counselor Brad Bigney defines an idol as "anything or anyone that captures our hearts and minds and affections more than God."

Let that sink in for a moment. An idol can literally be anything – anything we worship, turn to or depend on more than God. The enemy would rather we worship anything other than God. That opens the door quite a bit for the potential of idols in our lives.

What could we be harboring as an idol? It still can certainly be an object, like your cell phone. This is especially true when we devote more time to our phones than to growing in our relationship with God.



There are also things like money, fame, career, sex, stature, cars, houses, politicians, political parties, perfect health, our spouse, our kids – anything has the potential to become an idol in our lives. Some of these things in and of themselves aren't bad, many are good gifts given to us from God. But when we get our relationship with them out of balance, idolatry sets in, and we begin to worship the gift rather than the Giver.

We have to be honest with ourselves, we are all guilty of worshipping idols in some form. Not all of us struggle with the same idols. However, I'm going to go out on a limb and say I can guess the number one idol in your life – it's you! WE are our own biggest idol.

We desire prestige, so we buy that car, house, or new golf clubs to impress others with our supposed wealth and prominence. We desire comfort, so we justify coming home from work and spending the rest of the night mindlessly watching TV, all but ignoring our kids or other commitments. We desire pleasure and satisfaction, so we visit that webpage when no one is around. We desire applause, so we tell everyone how great a job we did at work, ignoring that it is God who gifted us with the talents and skills to do that job.

Herod was his own biggest idol, wanting the glory that is due only to God. But God will always get His glory. He will not share His glory with anyone or anything else (Isaiah 42:8)

Since no idol can compete with God, it is important to see that idols are not only futile – they are fatal. No idol could have created all that exists. No idol could send His son to die in our place. No idol can fully satisfy. No idol can lead to everlasting life. Worshipping them will ultimately lead to death.

### THE VITALITY OF GOD (VV. 24-25)

Thankfully, after those four depressing verses, we encounter the word, "But." Whenever there is a whole bunch of bad news in Scripture, followed by a "but" we know that whatever comes after the "but" is going to be really good news. Set against the fatality of idols, is the vitality of God. Idols lead to death, but only God leads to life. In Acts 12, the vitality of God was on display through two means – through His word and His church.

### **GOD'S WORD**

Despite Herod's attempts to wipe it out, God's Word continued to be proclaimed. The Gospel continued to be preached, and the early church continued to grow. Herod couldn't stop the Gospel from spreading and people's lives from being changed. The word of God grew and multiplied – it brought life to more and more people as they heard the good news of the Powerful Gospel!

In this current year, everyone's eyes are on the political scene. We see increased division in our culture and rapid decline into depravity. Now I'm not saying, don't vote. We absolutely should be voting; the stakes seem to get higher with every election. I think it's pretty clear who we should be voting for, but what our country and our society need even more than a good outcome in an election is the Gospel. We need to turn back to Jesus Christ, and as believers, we need to be bold in sharing that Gospel.

In the Book of Acts, the Gospel was being preached throughout the world. People in pagan lands were hearing how the false idols they worshipped were of no value to them. Instead through the preaching of the Apostles, they heard of the one true God who created the heavens and the earth and the seas and all that is in them. The people were told how they inherited a sin nature from their first parent, Adam, leaving them in a state of separation from the Creator God. They were His enemies, and there was nothing they could do to pay off their sin debts. But, through His only son, Jesus Christ, God paid it for them. Jesus, being fully God also took on human flesh. He lived a sinless life, going to the cross and dying to pay the penalty for their sins. He rose on the third day, conquering sin and death. The people heard that for those who admit their guilt before God and

believe and trust in Christ for salvation, they are saved! No longer enemies of God, they are children adopted into His family.

Even in the darkest times of great idolatry and apostasy, God has had faithful people He has equipped to proclaim His word. Sometimes it's a small number. During the flood of Genesis, only eight people were saved. Sometimes it was a lone prophet, declaring God's Word to a rebellious people. But no human institution, no human ruler is powerful enough to stop God's Word from growing and multiplying. Even if they attempt to imprison or put to death those whom God has appointed to proclaim His Word, it will go forth.

### **GOD'S CHURCH**

Barnabas and Saul returned from Jerusalem when they had fulfilled their ministry, which had to do with the great famine described in Acts 11. They had completed their mission of bringing aid to the people in Jerusalem affected by the famine (Acts 11:29–30), and now they have returned from Jerusalem.


There is a contrast to how God's church and human government both responded to this famine. The people of Tyre and Sidon depended on Herod for their food. Herod became angry with them, and we can infer he either withheld food or threatened to. But God's church sacrificially gave to help their fellow believers in need and freely took that food more than 300 miles from Antioch to Jerusalem.

The relationship between people who needed food and the government was one of fear, manipulation, and uncertainty. The relationship between people who needed food, and the church was one of love, generosity, and sacrifice. There are times when people need to rely on the government, but in His church, God has instituted a better way. God advances His Kingdom through the saints caring for one another.

Many churches have benevolence funds to help those struggling. A benevolence fund should not encourage financial irresponsibility, but we all know there are unexpected things that happen in our lives that take us by surprise. When you're faced with an unexpected expense, the tendency in our culture is to go into debt, rather than ask for help. The church, much more so than a government, is designed to help in situations like this, be it paying bills, buying groceries, giving rides, and more. God designed His church to care for one another.

The Book of Acts is the story of the Gospel spreading. God's Word and God's church advance, despite even the wicked intentions of evil rulers. One ruler set himself up as an idol. But idolatry is directly opposed to God, and therefore fatal. So, examine your hearts. What idols are lurking there? What idols are capturing your heart, mind, and affection more than God? Confess these idols and turn to the true and living God and worship Him. Demonstrate the love you have for Him by serving in your local church. Advance His kingdom by telling others about Him. Take the Gospel to the end of your street and if He calls you, to the end of the world.

### **Natural Disasters and the Local Church: An Opportunity for Evangelism and Growth**

Natural disaster response needs Christians and churches on the front lines, urged Samaritan's Purse CEO Edward Graham on "Washington Watch" Monday. Helping others in their moment of desperate need is a tangible way Christians can show selfless love to others in their community, and that opens the way to gospel conversations. With hurricane season in full

swing — Tropical Storm Helene is barreling toward the Gulf Coast as I write — this plea is particularly timely.

Hurricanes, fires, floods, tornadoes - such natural disasters can upend people's lives, destroying their homes and leaving them with nothing. In such desperate circumstances, people are jolted out of their comfortable routines and prompted to think about what really matters.

The book of Job illustrates this. Only amid his suffering did he reflect and grow in his understanding of God. In his suffering Job recognized his need for an intermediary (Job 9:33), placed unconditional hope in God (Job 13:15), called on God to justify him through faith (Job 16:19), and confessed belief in bodily resurrection (Job 19:25-26).

Samaritan's Purse strategically responds to natural disasters in a way that doesn't just address the physical needs of victims, but the emotional and spiritual needs as well. "For us, our volunteers can come and meet the immediate needs of those that are suf-



fering," Graham explained. "But they're going to ask you, 'Why are you here?' And we get to respond, 'Well, we love you. But more importantly, Jesus Christ loves you.' And it's just a neat way to bless those [who] are hurting and [who] think they've lost everything.

Samaritan's Purse teams go the extra mile to generate opportunities for gospel conversations. So, their teams not only replace torn-off roofs and refinish flood-damaged floors. They also sift through debris to find irreplaceable articles that may have survived. "When there's complete destruction, there's nothing ... it's hard to have a conversation with a homeowner about hope when they've lost everything," Graham added. "But just finding a ring — a wedding ring or engagement ring - will create a story and a conversation."

These conversations can lead to conversions, and that's where local churches come in. For all the evangelistic opportunities it generates, Samaritan's Purse is not competent to shepherd souls. The Lord Jesus gave the church shepherds and teachers who fill that role (Ephesians 4:11). "We'll live [with] and work [through] the local church because, after we leave, these new believers ... we want that church discipling and following up with them," said Graham.

Since churches will eventually take over the task of discipling new believers, it makes sense for them to get involved as soon as possible. Doing so will make passing the baton go more smoothly. "Nothing responds like the church. Especially the local church and Samaritan's Purse,'

Graham reiterated. "We have the equipment. We have the tools and the resources. We just need able-bodied people. ... This is something for youth groups to do, of people 14 years or older, prayer groups, Bible studies, your church, your office."

"I think people need to realize the church grows stronger as a result of helping those in need," agreed Family Research Council President Tony Perkins. This is part of the counter-intuitive economy of the kingdom of God. When Christians sacrifice their own preferences and convenience to help and serve others, the Holy Spirit uses that to produce within them "love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, 23 gentleness, self-control," so that it might be said that "those who belong to Christ Jesus have crucified the flesh with its passions and desires" (Galatians 5:22-24).

"There is nothing that will strengthen a local body than ministering to the needs of those in their community," said Perkins, "going hand-in-hand with Samaritan's Purse.'






